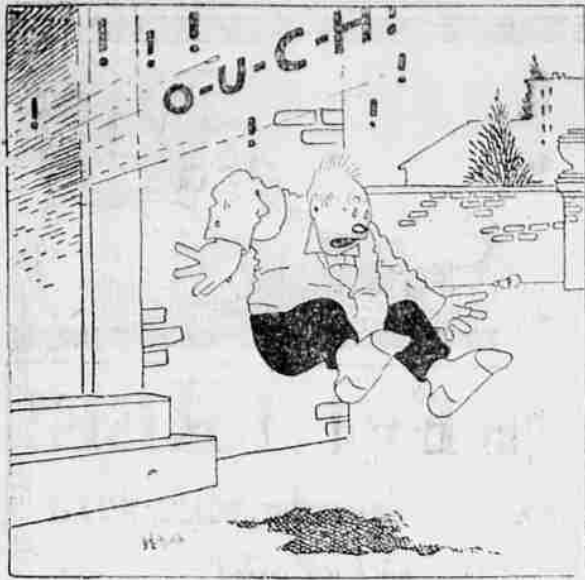

BRUSA, ONCE MORE UNDER GREEK RULE, WAXES PROSPEROUS

BRUSA, Asiatic Turkey, Dec. 2.—After 600 years of Turkish occupation, Brusa is again under the dominion of its ancient owners, the Greeks. Within sight of the tombs of the first six sovereigns of the Ottoman dynasty, thousands of Greek troops are quartered, and the old capital of Bithynia has every appearance of a great modern military base.

Trade is flourishing. The hotels are crowded with business men. Living is cheap. The Greek occupation has brought about a distinct revival of local commerce.

The Turkish merchants find the Greek soldiers good customers, and they are waxing rich on them. They have also found the Greek government good buyers. Some of them have closed large contracts for the feeding and equipment of King Constantine's Anatolian army. Others may be glad to see the Greeks go, but not Brusa's tradespeople. They have enjoyed no such prosperity in years.

Brusa lies on the slopes of verdant Mount Olympus, 50 miles southeast of Constantinople. It is considered the most beautiful city in the Turkish empire. King Constantine of Greece selected it as his home during his recent visit to Asia Minor. It is noted for its mineral baths and its silk products.

According to popular belief, it has a mosque and a promenade for every day in the year, so that one need pray or walk in the same place only once a year.

The city's population, which numbers about 100,000, is a bewildering mixture of Asiatic and European nationalities. One sees in the public square and the narrow cobbled streets groups of commercial travelers, tourists, holy men, scholars, dervishes, janissaries, eunuchs, veiled women, princes and paupers, millionaires and mendicants, soldiers and spies.

The market-place is a babel of tongues: Gentile and Jew, Moslem and Greek, Levantine and European rub elbows and speak each other's languages. They care little whether the Greek army or the Turkish army occupies the town; they want to be left in peace and allowed to pursue their wonted callings.

The port of Brusa is Mudania, on the Sea of Marmora, an hours ride by narrow gauge railroad from Brusa. Mudania is an important military base for the Greeks. Scores of army transports with men, munitions and supplies arrive weekly for the Anatolian front. During the recent operations near Angora, Mudania was the main artery of supply for the Greek troops. Thousands of Greek and Armenian refugees, fleeing Turkish nationalist reprisals, have sought shelter within the city of Brusa.

FIRMNESS SHOWS IN WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Considerable firmness developed in the wheat market today during the early part of the session. Absence of moisture where most needed in the southwest was the leading bullish factor. Advances, however, were checked by selling on the part of houses with eastern connections. Opening prices, which ranged from one-half cent decline to one-eighth cent gain, with December \$1.13 1/4 to \$1.13 1/2 and May \$1.16 1/4 to \$1.17 were followed by upturns all around and then something of a reaction.

Wet weather in the corn belt gave firmness to corn and oats. Corn opened one-eighth cent off to one-fourth cent up, May 54 1/4 to 54 1/2 and then scored a moderate general advance.

Oats started unchanged to one-fourth cent higher, May 35 1/2 to 35 3/4 and then hardened up a little more. Provisions were inactive but sustained by firmness in the hog market.

VICTIMS COLUMBIA BASIN WRECK ON ROAD TO RECOVERY

PORTLAND, Dec. 2.—Eighteen of the persons injured in the head-on collision early yesterday of two Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation Company passenger trains at Celilo, Ore., were reported recovering at a hospital here today. Three injured are at hospitals at The Dalles, and others were able to return to their homes.

Four unidentified bodies taken from the wreckage late yesterday increased the toll of life taken in the accident to ten.

Reports from The Dalles said the bodies of the four unknown victims were so badly mangled that identification would be difficult. The men were believed to have been railroad laborers engaged recently in shoveling snow in eastern Oregon.

The company is investigating the cause of the wreck. An inquest was to be held today at The Dalles. Incoming passengers said that the eastbound train was traveling at a slow rate of speed. It was under orders to proceed with caution. The westbound train, however, was said to be traveling at about thirty miles an hour. The meeting point was on a sharp curve.

COLD WEATHER PREVENTS FLOOD

SEATTLE, Dec. 2.—Sudden lowering of temperatures in the Cascade mountains last night caused drops of from one and one-half to two feet in flood waters of the Snoqualmie, Green and White rivers and other streams in western Washington which yesterday threatened serious damage as the result of continued rains and warm winds with resulting melting snows and high waters.

At Kent, south of here, water still covered the main business section this morning but the flood was receding rapidly and all danger was believed past.
