## TIME TO PUT ON NITRATE OF SODA

Nitrate of soda and nitrate of lime have been used in Jackson county on orchards for several years, and the best results have been obtained when the nitrate has been applied in the late fall or early winter. Ordinarily nitrate gives good results when applied in the spring but on account of the small amount of rainfall in this section and the fact that the tree roots gather their food from various depths and the heavy clay soils that are prevalent in Jackson county it is best to apply nitrates to orchards during December and January.

I have been informed that the Farm Bureau Exchange has a car of nitrate on the track now and can be obtained from the car at a less price than after it has been unloaded and stored. Orchardists interested can save money by getting their supply from the car.

## TRIGONIA RESUMES PARAFFINE SHOWS

Work at the Trigonía was suspended Thursday afternoon as a result of the smokestack being blown down. The damage was of little consequence and the repairs are now complete. Work on the well will be resumed today.

The showing at the well is much better than a week ago, more oil and gas being evident. Wednesday when the tools were removed from the well they were completely coated with paraffin. This showing of paraffin seems to establish the fact that in all possibility the oil from the well is a paraffin base oil. This means a high grade oil of good value.

The work at the well is progressing in a favorable manner and the consensus of opinion is that the showing at Trigonía establishes the fact that oil is present in this district and that commercial production depends solely on further development and drilling of wells.

## LOCAL INSTITUTE AT H. S. DEC. 10

A local institute is to be held at Medford high school next Saturday, December 10. The morning will be devoted to department sessions, opening at 10 o'clock under leadership of the several chairmen chosen at county institute in October. ## SHRINER REUNION CEREMONIAL HELD, 16 ARE INITIATED

ASHLAND, Dec. 2.—One of the most enjoyable ceremonial reunions in the history of Hillah Temple of the Mystic Shrine took place in this city on Friday afternoon and evening of this week. Weather conditions modified over the previous few days, with the result that there was a good attendance, Medford and Grants Pass being especially represented. The candidates included G. W. Porter, R. G. Bardwell, R. R. Reter, P. B. McDonald, and Dr. C. T. Sweeney, of Medford; R. E. Detrick, Louis Schwein, Frank G. Bean, Glenn E. Simpson, Archie E. Millon, of Ashland; A. K. Gibbs, of Roseburg; E. H. Hedrick of Central Point; Hans Nylander and T. A. Anderson of Klamath Falls. H. O. Frohbach of Medford, and J. G. Bromley of Grants Pass, also joined by affiliation from other temples.

The ladies were entertained at Masonic hall, and a fine banquet was served and a neat little program rendered for their benefit. The ceremonial proper was staged at the Armory, where the men dined at 6 p. m. after the "first section." In the evening, preliminary to the second section, routine business matters were transacted, including election of officers, the following being chosen for 1922: Frank J. Newman, Medford, potentate; T. H. Simpson, Ashland, chief rabban; P. B. Herman, Grants Pass, assistant rabban; P. K. Hammond, Ashland, high priest and prophet; Emil Britt, Jacksonville, oriental guide; C. H. Vaupel, Ashland, treasurer; W. H. Day, Ashland, recorder. W. H. McNair, of Ashland, retiring potentate, and W. E. Newcombe, of Grants Pass, were elected representatives to the Imperial council which meets in San Francisco next June. C. W. Nims, of Ashland, was re-elected trustee for the three-year term beginning Jan. 1, 1922. Officers on the appointive list will be named at the stated session in January when installation of the entire personnel will take place. The membership of Hillah Temple is 560, widely scattered.

## CANADIANS SEEK U. S. TAX RELIEF

WINDSOR, Ont., Dec. 2.—Relief from the double income tax Canadians who work in the United States would be forced to pay under the new American tax law is to be sought by William C. Kennedy, member of parliament for North Essex. The new law nullifies an agreement entered into two years ago by which citizens of Canada and the United States employed in the neighboring country were required to pay income taxes to but one country. The law would require Canadians to pay an eight per cent tax in this country without exemptions.

## CHESTER KUBLI IS FOUND GUILTY

The jury in the trial of Chester C. Kubli, charged with aiding and abetting a cashier to defraud a bank, a case arising out of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville returned a verdict of guilty Friday afternoon after three hours' deliberation. W. H. Johnson, former cashier of the bank, was the chief witness for the state, and was brought from Salem as a witness. The case will be appealed.

## BAR MORSE FROM FRENCH LANDING

PARIS, Dec. 2.—(By Associated Press.) The French ministry of the interior today issued an order denying Charles W. Morse, the right to land in France and requiring him to return to the United States on the first available steamer which would be the Paris sailing Monday from Havre.

Issuance of this order was confirmed in a letter from the French foreign office to the American embassy. The interior department has the right to refuse entry to any foreigner whom it judges undesirable.

## CONSIDER GERMAN MONEY RELIEF

PARIS, Dec. 2.—(By the Associated Press.)—The international reparations commission will probably begin formal consideration of the proposal for a moratorium on Germany's foreign debts at the meeting of the commission to be held next Tuesday, by which time it is expected that a formal request from the German government for a reparations holiday will have been received.

Unofficial dispatches received in reparations commission circles today announced that the Wirth government in Germany had decided to ask a moratorium and would follow the request with the reasons for it immediately.

## DAILY ROBBERY OF SMALL TOWN BANK

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Dec. 2.—Burglars last night entered the vault of the Nooksack Valley State bank at Everson and stole \$900 in cash and robbed about 100 safety deposit boxes of money and valuables. The robbers entered through a window, climbed through a trap door to the top of the vault and dug away the brick covering about two feet in thickness. The safety deposit boxes were smashed and thrown into a heap.

Henry P. Johnson, cashier, who discovered the robbers, estimated that the loss in Liberty bonds and other papers in the lock boxes was "a few thousand dollars." Other estimates ran as high as \$50,000.

## PENN STATE AND WASHINGTON MEET AT SEATTLE TODAY

SEATTLE, Dec. 2.—Penn State's football team, considered one of the strongest eleven in the east, meets the University of Washington in the big university stadium here today.

Hugo Bezdek, who was coach at the University of Oregon several years ago, has charge of the Nittany Lions, as the victors are called, and it is believed that tomorrow he will see his team win from Washington, something his Oregon teams seldom could do.

Washington this year is not rated strong. The eleven is being built over this season and did not win one of its Pacific Coast Conference games although it held the Stanford University team to a scoreless tie. Washington played several games before the conference season opened.

Things were different in the days when Bezdek was at Oregon. Then Gil Dobie coached Washington and the local Sundoggers were practically supreme, holding the coast football championship for several years. Several times Bezdek had first class teams down at Oregon, but when they went against Washington, they seldom won.

Penn State, it is thought, will have little trouble in running up a score on Washington. Lieutenant Governor W. J. Coyle of Washington, who was a Sundodger star quarterback under Dobie, watched the Lions play in the east recently and brought back the report that the Staters had the greatest eleven he ever saw. And Coyle saw the champion University of California undefeated eleven win from Washington State at Portland.

The visitors tomorrow will be playing only another of their many games away from home. Penn State is located in Center county, Pennsylvania, a place hard to reach so the team plays nearly all its games on strange gridirons. This year they played Harvard in Cambridge, Georgia Tech in New York Pitt at Pittsburg and now Washington in Seattle.

## RAILROADS LOWER FARMER'S RATES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—A general decrease of ten per cent in the rates of practically all farm products was authorized by the inter-state commerce commission in passing favorably on the voluntary application of all the roads except those in New England territory.

The commission, acting with great expedition on the application of the railroads, which was barely completed this week, repealed all of its outstanding orders affecting rates which would interfere and authorized the railroads to establish and maintain a lower schedule for a period of six months.

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
