Apple production in Oregon jumped from fewer than 2,000,000 boxes in 1909 to almost 7,000,000 boxes a year in 1919, even though production in the United States fell from 155,000 acres to 115,000 acres in the same decade, according to W. S. Brown, chief of horticulture at Oregon Agricultural college. Pears, peaches, and grapes suffered a heavy decline in the country at large, although most of these made rapid and steady growth in Oregon. The dried prune output in the state is annually 30,000,000 to 40,000,000 pounds, while berry production last year was almost 19,000,000 quarts. —Portland Journal.
