URGES FORMATION OF LOCAL HUMANE SOCIETY BRANCH

Mayor C. E. Gates acted as chairman at this noon's chamber of commerce Forum luncheon and Secretary Frohbach acted as song leader in the absence of Rev. Millard, the official song leader.

Elmer Wilson was formally initiated to the order of the "Two-Toots" and blew the horn presented to him by Will Warner in the customary and approved manner. He appointed as his successor on the membership committee, Earl Gaddis.

Bon Sheldon brought before the meeting the question of admitting non-residents, of Medford and environs, and traveling men who make their headquarters in this city to associate membership in the chamber of commerce on a \$5 per year fee. Glenn O. Taylor and J. W. Wakefield spoke in favor of the proposition and F. E. Merrick moved that it be laid before the board of directors for definite arrangement; which motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Mrs. P. W. Swanton, general manager of the Oregon Humane society was the first principal speaker and addressed the meeting on the subject, "The Oregon Humane Society," outlining its work and bringing to the attention of the meeting cases which require attention by the society or by local authority. These cases are in the midst of the community and it came as a surprise to learn of deplorable conditions described by Mrs. Swanton which have escaped the public notice. Mrs. Swanton urged the establishment of a county branch of the humane society showing wherein it would constitute a great advantage to the community without expense.

John E. Gratke, assistant of Julius Meier, chairman of the 1925 Exposition board was the next speaker and spoke in favor of the exposition illustrating the inestimable advantage such a project offers to the entire state. He showed that the number of automobiles alone will come into the state in 1925 will, by consuming 100 gallons of gasoline each bought in the state, returned to the state treasury \$4,000,000 through the medium of the gasoline tax as it stands at present. He stated that the conglomerate advantages and profits which will be realized are beyond human conception but that the advertising which the exposition will accomplish is valued by the exposition board at \$10,000,000.

Mr. Gratke's address was fluent and forcible and in it he augmented Mrs. Swanton's suggestion that a county branch of the Humane Society be formed here.
