

IRISH PEACE IS CHRISTMAS GIFT FOR HUMANITY

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 7.—Former Governor Martin H. Glynn of New York state, through whom Prime Minister Lloyd George invited Ramon DeValera to negotiations that finally led to an agreement for settlement of the Irish question, said today that the world owed Lloyd George a debt of gratitude.

"Lloyd George has settled a problem that has baffled statesmen for seven hundred years," said Mr. Glynn. "And in all justice to the Irish leaders, it must be admitted that DeValera, Collins and Griffith have placed themselves among the clever statesmen of the world. The settlement of the Irish question is a great Christmas gift to humanity."

"In my conference with Lloyd George, I found him intensely interested in the human side of the Irish question. A Celt himself, Lloyd George had a warm spot in his heart for the Irish that made him friendly disposed. He believed that the status of Ireland was working harm toward friendship between England and the United States."

Confer on Reparations.

PARIS, Dec. 7.—Louis Louchier, minister of liberated regions, will leave Paris tonight for London to confer with the British cabinet on the general situation, it was announced today.

Presumably the conference concerns the German reparations situation.

Canadian Ship Afloat.

VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 7.—The Canadian government merchant marine steamer Canadian Rover, which went aground near Campbell river, B. C., last night, was floated without assistance today and proceeded on her way to Ocean Falls, B. C., apparently undamaged, according to messages received here.

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W. AND J. ALL READY TO PLAY U. OF C. IN PASADENA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The Washington and Jefferson college football team, which has accepted an invitation to play at the Tournament of Roses at Pasadena, Cal., January 2, has no game scheduled for that date at Dallas, Texas, according to R. M. Murphy, athletic director of W. and J., commenting today on the report from Los Angeles that the University of California officials would withhold decision as to whether the Pacific coast gridder would meet W. and J. unless the latter team cancelled the Dallas engagement. Mr. Murphy declared that the presidents had no game scheduled at Dallas and that they would not play football again until they take the field at Pasadena.

Mr. Murphy explained that before W. and J. received the invitation from the Tournament of Roses officials a southern college asked the presidents to go to Dallas and meet the winner of the southern conference football race. Washington and Jefferson officials, he said, forwarded terms for such a game to Dallas, but they were unacceptable, and the negotiations ended.

GIANTS WANT GROH, OFFER \$100,000

BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 7.—Judge K. M. Landis dropped in to visit the minor league league magnates at work in annual meeting here today. He will be the speaker at a dinner tonight given by the local committee to delegates attending the 21st annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball leagues. The arrival of the commissioner and the deal between the New York Giants and Cincinnati by which Heinie Groh will become a member of the New York team divided interest among baseball men. John J. McGraw, of the Giants, refused again today to confirm the report that a cash consideration of \$100,000 went with Burns and Gonzalez in the trade for Groh.

Jap Diplomat to Uruguay.
MONTEVIDEO, Dec. 7.—Takahashi Nakamura, the first minister to be accredited to Uruguay by Japan, has presented his credentials to President Brum. Announcement of a Japanese-Uruguayan commercial treaty is to be made in the near future.

The Girl in a Taxi
The Girl in a Taxi, starring Mr. and Mrs. Carter DeHaven, will be shown at the Rialto theatre four days beginning today.

The picture is an adaptation of the musical comedy stage success of the same name in which Mr. DeHaven scored a triumph. The story centers around the exploits of a young man whose father has dubbed him a molly-coddle. His efforts to untangle the embarrassing situation that confronts his father earns for him a temporary laurel wreath. The situation which caps the climax of the farce comedy is said to be most humorous.

Big Thrills in "Conflict"

One of the most thrilling pictures ever made for the screen was shown yesterday at the Pogo theatre, what "Conflict" Priscilla Dean's latest production, had its premier in this city. The picture is the last word in screen melodrama and it grips one with its suspense almost from the first flash.

Its climax is built around the dynamic of a big log-jam in the swollen waters of the great north woods, and the succeeding flood of logs and water down the valley, sweeping everything in its path. The big punch comes when the heroine, played by Miss Dean, rides madly down the bank abreast of the flood, leaps perilously from log to log through the flow, and rescues her unconscious sweetheart, played by Herbert Rawlinson, just as he is about to be swept over a cataract.

The logging camp scenes of "Conflict" are a revelation in screen verisimilitude. Miss Dean and her company passed several weeks in the timber country of Oregon filming the story in its proper settings.

Portland Doctor Sentenced.

SEATTLE, Dec. 7.—Dr. Howard Blake, physician of Portland, Ore., pleaded guilty in federal court here today to two counts of an indictment charging him with violation of the anti-narcotics statutes. He was sentenced to serve a year and a day in the federal penitentiary at McNeil Island, Wash., on each of the counts.

DULUTH, Minn., Dec. 7.—E. J. Filtrah, of Duluth, was elected president of the Theodore Roosevelt International Memorial association last night. E. A. Cox, of Lewiston, Idaho, was named first vice president.

CANADIANS VOTE FOR RECIPROCITY, LIBERALS IN LEAD

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Although returns from yesterday's general election were still incomplete this morning, it was apparent for the first time in ten years Canada had elected a parliament with a majority favoring reciprocity with the United States.

In the new house of commons, W. L. Mackenzie King, liberal leader, will have a clear majority over all parties and will become dominion prime minister. The progressives also favoring reciprocity and a low tariff will rank second, and the high tariff party, headed by Premier Meighen, third. Mr. Meighen himself was defeated in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, his home district.

Three provinces, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, returned solid liberal contingents. Ontario, regarded as the fortress of conservatism and protection, showed a liberal gain of more than twenty seats.

The new progressive party, led by T. A. Creever of Manitoba, swept the western provinces.

The liberal platform asked that goods of British countries be given preferential tariff treatment.

Women voted yesterday for the first time on terms of equality with men. Miss MacPhail, progressive, was elected to parliament in the southeast grey district of Ontario. She will be the first woman member of the house of commons.

William Lyon Mackenzie King is a grandson of William Lyon Mackenzie, a leader in the struggle for responsible government in Canada. He is 47 years old. He holds post-graduate degrees from the University of Chicago and Harvard. He was minister of labor for Canada for eight years in the Laurier government.

CHINESE AT AMOY START BOYCOTT

AMOY, China, Dec. 7.—(By Associated Press.) Friction arising between the local British and Chinese authorities in regard to the British concessions here has resulted in the declaration of a boycott by the Chinese against Butterfield and Swire, an English firm with wide connections. The Chinese are said to be endeavoring to expand it into a general boycott against the British.

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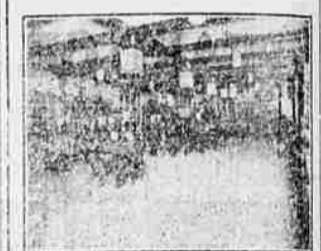
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
