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CROP REPORT WILL BE OUT DEC. 28

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The date of issuance by the department of agriculture of the December crop report giving latest acreage, yield per acre and production figures for staple crops in 1921 and revised figures for 1919 and 1920 was announced today as having been changed from December 15 to December 28, at 4 p. m., and the date for the issuance of the estimated acreage and condition of fall sown wheat and rye has been changed from December 17 to December 29 at 12:30 p. m.

This postponement, the department said, was made to enable the crop reporting board to complete its work. The recommitment of the crop estimates and census figures for 1919, the department added, was especially difficult because of abnormal changes due to the war in crop acreages shown in the census report for 1919, upon which the estimates for the succeeding twelve years were based.

State Traffic Meeting. SALEM, Ore., Dec. 8.—A conference of the state traffic departments of Oregon and Washington will be held in Olympia Friday of this week, according to announcement here today, for the purpose of ironing out misunderstandings with respect to motor vehicle regulation applying to vehicles operating in both states.

Probe Dye Lobby. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The long pending King resolution directing an investigation by congress into the activities of an alleged dyestuffs lobby was adopted today by the senate without a record vote.

NO MORE GAS IN MODERN WARS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(By Associated Press.) Complete abandonment of all forms of chemical warfare is understood to have been recommended to the American arms conference delegation by its official advisory committee.

Roads for Jobs. OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 7.—Immediate construction and maintenance of highway throughout the country as means of relieving unemployment was advocated today before the national convention of the American association of state highway officials by T. H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture. He said it was his department's intention to use road construction as a means of furnishing work during financial depressions.
