

ABE EVANS DOOMED TO HANG, FAILS IN SUICIDE ATTEMPT

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 8.—Abe Evans, who is in the state penitentiary under sentence of death for killing James Doran of McMinnville, again tried to commit suicide in his cell early today, prison officers announced. This is Evans' third attempt against his own life since his arrest.

When a guard went to Evans' cell at 6:30 o'clock this morning he found the prisoner suspended from a steam pipe with an improvised rope made from his mattress, pillow and underwear about his neck. He was nearly unconscious. A guard visits the cells of all men in murderers' row at intervals of not more than fifteen minutes. Evans was sentenced to hang on December 2, but his wife appealed his case to the supreme court and the execution was automatically stayed. Evans objected to an appeal, declaring he wanted to die.

Evans was convicted of killing Doran in Wasco county near The Dalles, while Doran and another man were being taken from Bend to McMinnville by Evans in his automobile.

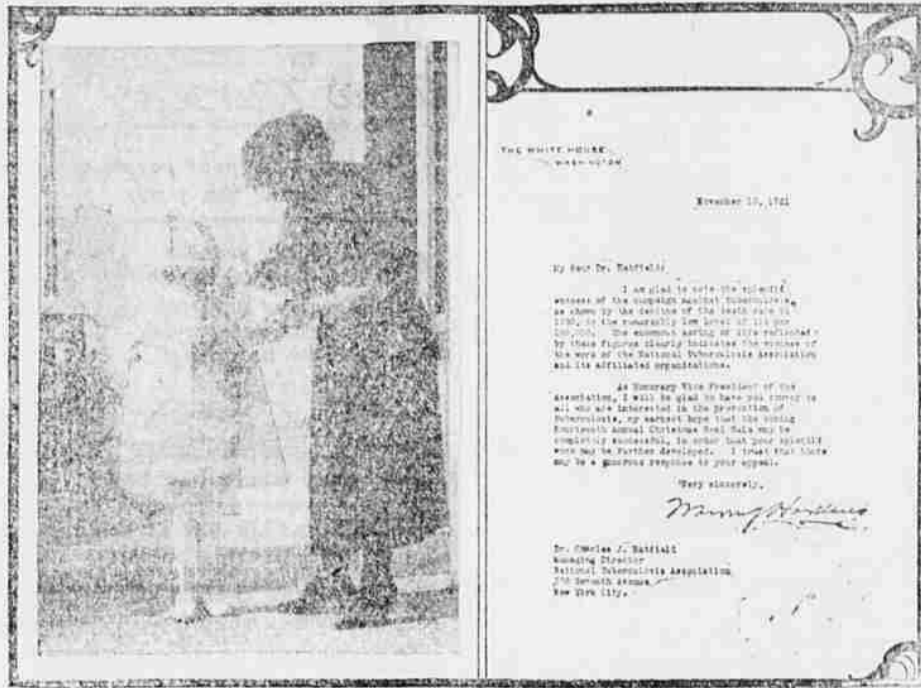
WASHINGTON ASKS FOR ADMISSION TO COAST ATHLETICS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8.—Application of the University of Washington for admission to the Northwest intercollegiate conference and a similar application from Gonzaga university at Spokane, were placed before representatives of the seven institutions composing the conference at the annual meeting here today.

There was no question that Washington would be admitted, according to statements of delegates, as it has been known for some time that it was anxious to get back into the fold. As the Gonzaga application was not expected there was nothing certain as to what action would be taken, as the delegates had not had time to get together on it.

It was considered likely that whatever football dates are arranged this afternoon will be subject to change if their conflict with coast conference dates to be fixed later this week.

TILLAMOOK FARMS MIGHT STAY HOME AND FIGHT WILLS

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Dec. 8.—Information has reached this city that many of the stockmen and ranchers of the lower Salmon river were forced to flee from their homes when that river overflowed and spread over the low country nearby, furniture and bedding and winter supplies in the houses were spoiled and many people were rendered homeless. The section suffering most was about Otis, near the mouth of Salmon river, and about forty-five miles distant from Tillamook.

TACOMA, Dec. 8.—Jack Dempsey, the heavyweight champion, announced at a sportsman's dinner here last night that he is planning a hunting trip for big game in Africa.

"I'm going after lions, elephants and the like," Dempsey said. "I'm going into the same section that Roosevelt covered in his hunting trip."

Dempsey said he has long wanted to make a hunting trip and he intends to carry out his intention "not to hunt for a year or two."

DRILLING DELAYED AT TRIGONIA WELL

An accident which will delay drilling operations at the Trigon Oil well for several days and yet, which is a point in favor of the producing possibilities of the well, occurred yesterday morning about ten o'clock.

Drilling operations were proceeding in a satisfactory manner when a gas pocket was struck which caused the entire 1200 and some odd feet of casing to be raised six inches and the drilling tools to be thrown upward into the casing a distance of fifteen feet where they jammed and were covered with sediment which was also

forced upward from the bottom of the hole by the pressure of the released gas.

The casing was well seated when the accident occurred and the water was entirely shut out, the drilling going on in a dry hole 22 feet below the end of the casing. The re-seating of the casing is now going on and when the water is again shut off, a large increase in the oil showing is expected.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—A petition for a writ of injunction against the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America and its officers and agents to restrain them from interfering with the conducting of business at the stockyards where picketing has been in progress was filed in superior court today by twenty-two packing companies.
