

LAST HOPES FOR AMUNDSEN MEN ARE DISPELLED

SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—The Associated Press dispatch from London telling of the finding near the mouth of the Yenesei river, western Siberia, of the bodies of Knudsen and Tessen, members of the Amundsen arctic expedition, dispels hope that he had held for nearly two years that the men had survived Captain Roald Amundsen, leader of the expedition, said today.

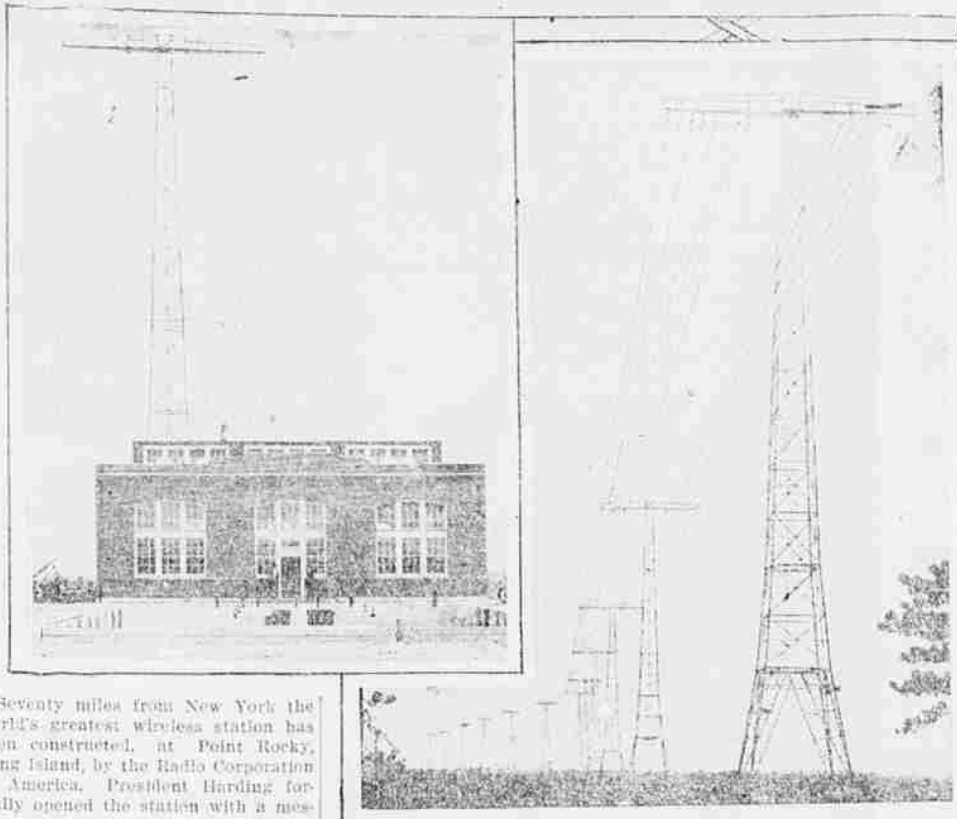
"Both Knudsen and Tessen were experienced Arctic explorers," Captain Amundsen said, "and while we feared the worst, we still hoped that they had been able to reach safety."

"We wintered in 1915 at Cape Cheskin. We were getting ready to push into the Arctic ice pack, and Knudsen and Tessen were sent back with dispatches for the Norwegian government. They were to go to to Dickson Island, 500 miles distant, where the nearest station was situated. They were fully equipped for the journey, which is not a long one in the Arctic. Moreover, there were three large caches of food along their route. From Dickson Island they were to return to Norway."

"In view of their equipment and the presence of the caches, their destruction is almost incomprehensible. We did not learn for more than a year that they had failed to arrive at Dickson Island."

Captain Amundsen came to Seattle from the Arctic last summer. He expects to resume his polar explorations next May.

World's Greatest Wireless Station Opened



Seventy miles from New York the world's greatest wireless station has been constructed, at Point Rocky, Long Island, by the Radio Corporation of America. President Harding formally opened the station with a message to twenty-eight countries—to all of Europe and even as far as Japan and Australia. With the opening of Radio Central, New York becomes the focal point of world-wide wireless communication. This means that existing radio and cable facilities to such leading commercial nations as Great

Britain, France, Norway and Germany are now supplanted by a direct radio telegraph service. When completed the plant will cover ten square miles and will be so powerful that, with all its energy mobilized behind a message it can be forced through to its destination no matter what the atmospheric obstacles. It will crash through static in a way that no station in the world can approach. The photographs show the powerhouse and the towers which are stretched out for a distance of nearly three miles.

FRESH DISORDERS IN STRIKE DISTRICT

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Fresh disorders in the stockyards district broke out late today despite the presence of more than 1500 policemen. A mob of approximately 500 persons formed near one of the packing plants and efforts of mounted police to disperse it by charging back and forth only resulted in a series of fights in which, according to first reports, dozens of persons were injured.

OREGON DAIRYMEN TO HAVE ELECTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8.—The directors of the Oregon Dairymen's Co-operative league announced last night they had decided to call another election on the proposal for liquidation of the league in view of the fact that little more than one-third of the members voted Tuesday, and that little more than half of those that voted were for liquidation. The directors in a statement said members generally did not realize that it was proposed to form local organizations in the various districts of the state and to turn over to them the plants now operated by the league.

KING GEORGE OPENS PRISON DOORS

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—(By the Associated Press)—King George's proclamation of amnesty for Irishmen under internment resulted in the release today of many prisoners who had been interned in the Kilmahanna and Arbour Hill camps and the Mountjoy jail. Expressions of satisfaction over the peace terms were numerous among the men set free.

KANSAS MINERS TO BE DISCIPLINED

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 8.—Action of John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America in revoking the charter of the Kansas district organization and closing its offices was advocated by the executive board of the miners in session here today.

DEFICIENCY BILL EXCEEDS SUMS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The first deficiency bill, carrying slightly more than \$100,000,000, or approximately \$2,000,000 more than the measure passed by the house was reported today to the senate.

The principal increases over the house bill are \$1,500,000 to repair and replace the government cable to Alaska and \$400,000 more for the payment to farmers to meet losses resulting from livestock slaughtered under government orders because of tuberculosis.

Governors Criticize Rates. CHARLESTON, S. C., Dec. 8.—Criticism of the federal control of state railroad rates was one of the leading features of the discussion in the final session of the conference of governors today. Among those who protested against what was described as an invasion of and encroachment on state rights by the federal government in this respect were Governors Sproul of Pennsylvania.

GUATEMALA REVOLT ALL QUIET NOW

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 8.—(By Associated Press) Private messages received here from Guatemala City indicate that former President Cabrera was liberated from prison during Thursday morning's revolt in which the government of Carlos Herrera was overthrown. These advices urge Guatemalan political exiles here to return home immediately as "all is well."

ORANGE COVE BANK VAULTS BLOWN

FRESNO, Cal., Dec. 8.—The safe in the First National Bank of Orange Cove, thirty miles south of Fresno was blown open last night and \$1,600 in currency stolen.

Jap Reds Arrested. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—According to advices reaching the Japanese armament headquarters from Tokyo today twelve alleged Japanese communists have been arrested there. The authorities are conducting a rigid investigation in the belief that secret group of Japanese communists numbering about 150 exists in Japan.

Pope Sends Message. LONDON, Dec. 8.—(By Associated Press) Messages of congratulation have been sent by Pope Benedict to King George and Kamonn DeValera for the part they played in the Anglo-Irish agreement, according to a dispatch from Rome today to the Central News Agency.

McConnell Sold. BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 8.—Charles O'Connell, of the San Francisco club in the Pacific Coast league, has been bought by Manager J. J. McGraw, of the New York Giants, it was announced here today. The price paid for the outfielder was \$75,000, said to be the highest figure ever given for a player taken from minor league company.

Ginned Cotton Report. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Cotton ginned prior to December 1 amounted to 7,849,370 running bales, including 121,859 round bales, counted as half bales, 22,058 bales of American-Egyptian, and 2,915 bales of Sea Island, the census bureau announced today.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—Jack Miller of the Philadelphia Nationals has been signed as manager of the San Francisco club of the Pacific Coast Baseball league, according to a telegram received here from Charles Graham, one of the club owners, who is in Buffalo, N. Y., attending the meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball leagues. Miller was captain of the St. Louis Cardinals for four years.

Legion Commander Elected. HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 8.—Fordham B. Kimball, young orchardist and apple shipping man, was elected commander of the American Legion post last night. Fred H. Bell was chosen vice commander; Harry Farrell, adjutant; Dr. V. R. Abraham and Edward W. Van Horn, members of the executive committee.

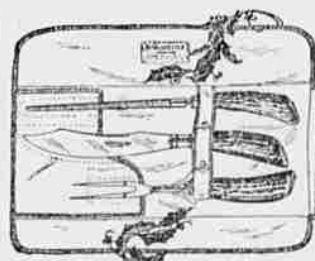

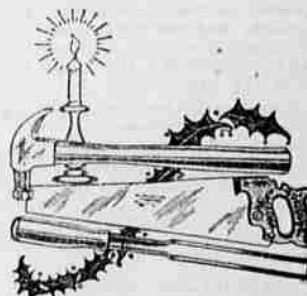

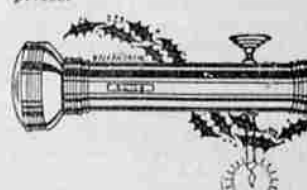
