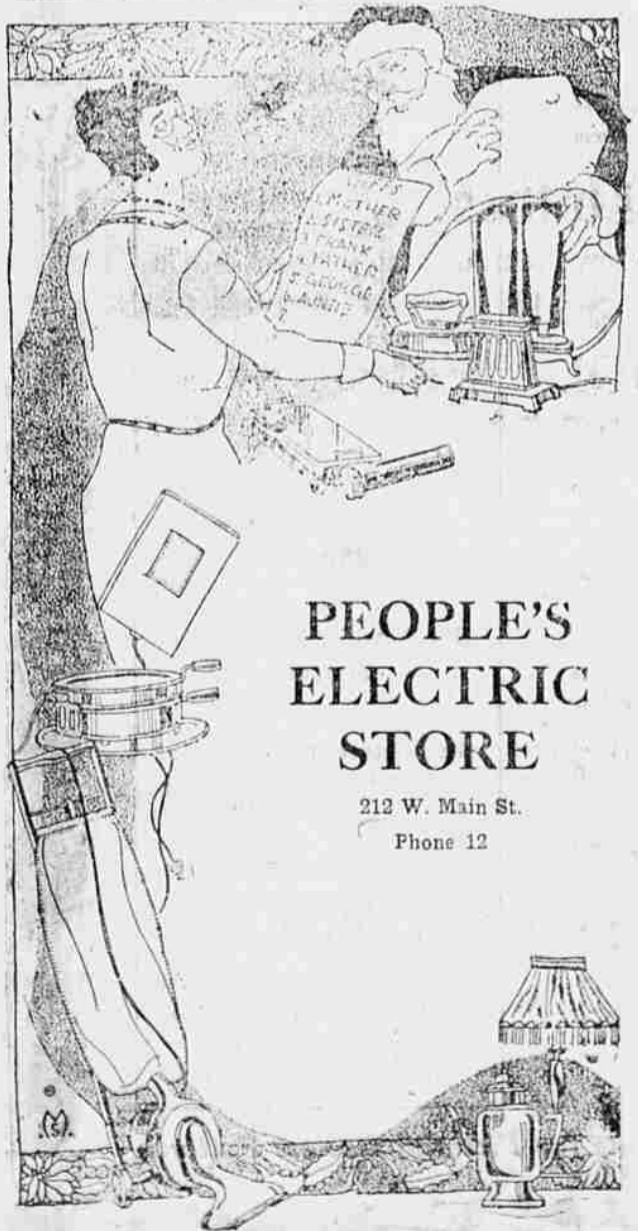

LUCKNOW GREETS BRITISH PRINCE

LUCKNOW, British India, Dec. 9.—The prince of Wales who is on a tour of India, arrived here today and was enthusiastically welcomed by the municipal authorities. Governor Sir Harewood Butler, in the executive council yesterday, endorsed the action of the authorities in arresting a number of prominent non-cooperators, who had, on the occasion of the prince's visit by intimidating loyalists and inciting a movement of civil disobedience.

FINAL DECREES FOR SCIENCE PAPER

POSTON, Dec. 9.—Justice DeCoursey of the supreme court today ordered final decrees to carry into effect the recent decision of the full bench in the Christian Science church litigation. This decision dismissed the suit brought by trustees of the Christian Science Publishing society and held that the directors of the first Church of Christ, Scientist, had control over the society.
