TRY TO CLEAN UP SHANTUNG MESS' TOO MANY STRINGS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(By Associated Press.) Embarking on a quest to settle the Shantung controversy, the Chinese and Japanese armistice delegates spent the entire forenoon today attempting to dispose of the question of public properties in the Kiaochow peninsula. Further discussion was planned for the afternoon. Japan already has agreed to return to China all public properties in the leasehold, China agreeing to refund money spent by the Japanese since Japan succeeded in the German rights. The delegates now have reached the question of "municipal enterprises." "Too many strings are attached to what the Japanese declare themselves willing to give up," one Chinese delegate said, "progress is necessarily slow." The two delegations hoped to reach the question of opening the port of Tsing Tao to the commerce of the world on equal terms during the day.

Italian Earthquakes

ROME, Dec. 10.—By the Associated Press.—Serious earthquake shocks have been reported throughout this week from the region of Lake Bolsena, 60 miles northwest of here. The ground in several villages shows large fissures and most of the inhabitants are camping in the fields. No deaths have been reported.
