YAP QUESTION SETTLED

visiting delegation discussion of home-ward reservations has become a matter of immediate importance.

Outstanding in any tabulation of accomplishments is the four-power agreement. By this agreement the United States, Great Britain, France and Japan agreed "to respect their rights to respect their rights in relation to their insular possessions and dependencies in the region of the Pacific ocean" for the next ten years.

Upon ratification of this agreement the Anglo-Japanese alliance, long regarded with distrust in the United States and several British dominions, will be abrogated.

Limitation of naval armaments, the first subject of the conference agenda, remains practically in the status in which it was found after Secretary Hughes had declined the American proposal for a reduction of capital ships to a 5-5-2 ratio basis between the United States, Great Britain and Japan.

Intertwoven with the ensuing negotiations has been the question of the Pacific naval bases and fortifications upon which no formal action has yet been taken, but it is understood, Japan has received assurances of recognition of the status quo.

Land armaments have not yet been taken beyond the general discussion. It is the general impression that land-bases to themselves will not be taken up for any definite action at the present meeting aside from the phases involved in future rules to be drafted by a committee.

The conference on Pacific and Far Eastern questions, comprising China, Belgium, Portugal and Holland, in addition to the five major powers, have taken action as follows:

Adopted the four "root points" to respect the independence, territorial and administrative integrity of China; to provide a unimpaired opportunity for China to develop and maintain an effective government to

maintain equal opportunity for all in China; to refrain from taking advantage of existing conditions to obtain special rights, which would abridge the rights of friendly states.

Adopted resolutions on extraterritoriality providing for the withdrawal of a commission of jurists to investigate conditions in China with a view to abolishing such rights.

Adopted a resolution in respect to the withdrawal of Chinese troops from other powers (Japan) in which the Chinese are to be consulted in the matters already dealt with.

Adopted resolutions declaring for withdrawal of foreign postoffices from China and limiting use of foreign radio stations in China.

Appointed expert committee to recognize Chinese financial autonomy.

Resolved Chinese "open port" declarations setting forth the principles to govern relations between China and other powers (Japan) of those are considered in the matters already dealt with.

Debated proposal that foreign troops be withdrawn from China.

Remaining on the agenda are the questions of Siberia, Yap and Shanghai. Yap has been the subject of negotiations between the American and Japanese governments which are said to be virtually completed.

Settlement of the Shanghai question has been undertaken in a separate conference of the Japanese and Chinese delegates, which has already resulted in agreement on many important details.
