The legislative reapportionment bill, passed by the 1921 session of the state legislature, will have no effect on the attendance of members of the house and senate at the special session, according to an opinion written by Attorney General Van Winkle for Charles P. Hopkins, joint representative from Douglas and Jackson counties.
