EUROPE LOOKS TO AMERICA FOR AID IN MONEY WOES

LONDON, Dec. 13.—The Daily Chronicle, which is reported as being close to government sources of information, displays today a special article concerning the proposed financial conference to follow adjournment of the present conference in Washington.

In its editorial columns the newspaper says: "This gives practical shape to the idea of doing for Europe what the Washington conference has done for the Pacific."

Declaring that it is not suggested that the United States shall be asked to take the initiative, it adds: "There is nothing to prevent Great Britain and France from benefiting from American example to call a European conference in which America, if she cared not to do more, would doubtless be willing to participate in a watching or advisory capacity."

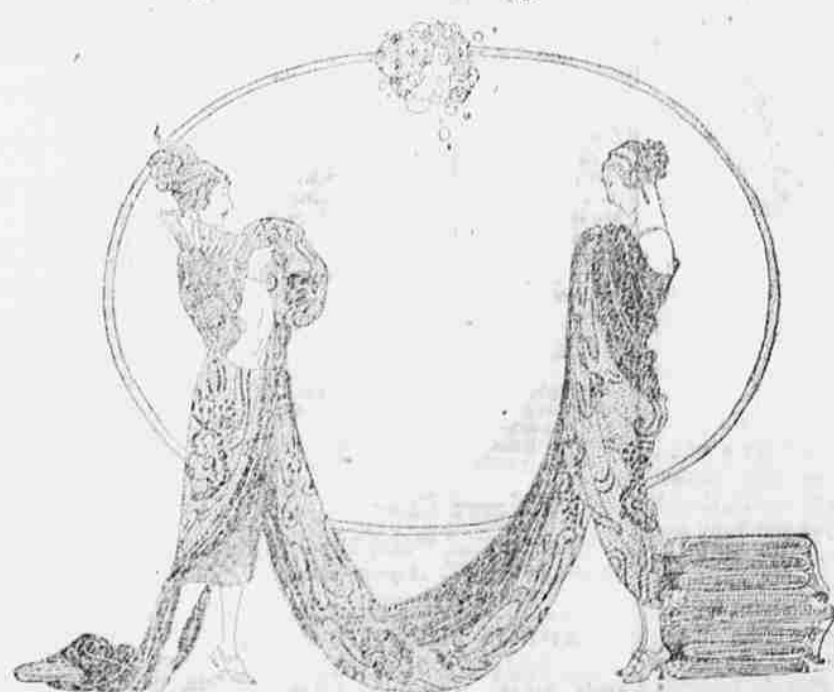
