STATE VETERANIAN INSPECTS DISEASE OF VALLEY SHEEP

Dr. Derflinger, deputy state veterinarian from Salem, has been in the valley for a few days investigating a disease that is causing trouble with sheep in various parts of the country. Dr. Derflinger thinks the trouble is malignant edema, which is a new disease for this section, and steps should be taken to check this trouble before it gets a foothold. There is also a possibility that there is some hemorrhagic septicaemia in some of the flocks. Both these diseases may be benefited by vaccination and farmers having trouble should communicate with the county agent's office, as Dr. Derflinger will be in the county until Friday night. Immediate action is necessary if these diseases are prevented from getting a foothold in the county.

LIGHT VOTE IN FAIR ELECTION, CLOSES AT 8 P. M.

The vote cast at today's special election for the fair to improve the county fair grounds was very light in the city and many voters in the city do not vote and many voters do not vote at all. In fact, the vote was so light that it is believed that the fair will not be held this year, as a fair cannot be held in the towns and rural districts of the county, and therefore Medford must carry a heavy vote for it.
