

ADJUST PRICE TO BE PAID PLAYERS UNDER DRAFT LAW

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—(By Associated Press.) Several plans for a restoration of the draft under conditions satisfactory to both minor and major leagues were being considered by the baseball advisory council today.

One of the plans provided that in the event of a class AA club losing a player via draft, the major league club receiving the player, after paying \$2500 as provided in the present arrangement, would send a player to the AA club in the place of the drafted man. Another proposed that the draft price be raised to \$7500, and that in case the drafted player did not measure up to major league standards, he should be returned to the club from which he was taken at half the draft price.

The major leagues resumed their joint session in order to settle a few matters, including the proposal to rescind the rule prohibiting world's series players from barnstorming and Commissioner Landis' suggestion for a reduction in admission prices for the world's series.

Judge Landis yesterday carried through one of his ideas—the seven game world's series.

ANDES VOLCANO IN VIOLENT ERUPTION

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eruption of a volcano in the Andes mountains, believed to be Mount Rincón, in Chile, is reported in dispatches received here. The townships Osorno, Union and San Pablo, Chile, were considerably damaged by falling rocks. Great clouds of ashes obscured the sun, the entire day.

Incidental damage is said to have been done to the grazing lands north of Lake Nahuel-Huapi, hot ashes covering the ground to a depth of nearly six inches. The livestock there are in danger of starvation unless they can be transported from the affected zone.

Further eruptions are feared.

HEAVY SNOWFALL IN MONTANA, CHILLY

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 15.—The snow storm that broke over Montana Wednesday morning and yesterday afternoon began clearing early this afternoon. Approximately nine inches of snow are reported from the southeastern portion of the state. Considerable drifting, blocking highways is reported from Livingston, Bozeman and Miles City.

The forecast for Montana for Friday night and Saturday is fair with rising temperatures. Temperature during the storm approached the zero mark but was reported below zero from no point.

CHINA TRADE BILL PASSES SENATE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The China trade bill was passed by the senate late today with provisions incorporated by the house for granting tax exemption privileges to American correspondents doing business in China stricken out. The bill in general provides for the organization under federal charter of American concerns for business in China. The measure now goes to conference with the house.

The Noted Dead

LONDON, Dec. 15.—General Sir John Eccles Nixon, commander of the British forces in Mesopotamia in 1915 and 1916, died at St. Raphael, France, on Thursday, according to a Marseilles dispatch to the Times. After his return from Mesopotamia, he was cleared of all responsibility for the British forces' defeat which resulted in retreat from Bagdad.

Tubing Prices Drop

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Dec. 15.—The National Tube company today announced a reduction of 2 1/2 points in the price of all base sizes of tubing. This, officials said, meant a reduction of approximately \$5 a ton.

NEW YORKER, KING OF NAPOLEON MAY BE ALBANIA KING

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—A. J. Chavrov, Albanian high commissioner at Washington, in conferring with Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte of New York, an American member of the Bonaparte family regarding an invitation to him to ascend the throne of Albania, vacant since William of Wied fled to Switzerland at the beginning of the world war, the New York Evening Mail said today it had been informed.

Mr. Bonaparte has denied that the crown had been offered him or that he had been conferring with Albanian representatives on the subject.

Mr. Bonaparte is a descendant of Elizabeth ("Betsy") Patterson, of Baltimore, whom Jerome Bonaparte married in this country after he had been exiled from France by Napoleon Bonaparte. Jerome later became king of Westphalia and remarried in Europe when Napoleon refused to recognize his American marriage.

Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte is the great great nephew of Napoleon.

YOUTHS SUSPECTED OF MURDER FREED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 15.—Authorities seeking to solve the mystery of the death of E. B. Davis, ex-service man, formerly of Helena, Mont., whose body was found in his cabin near Missoula this week, were today without any clue. Harry Friedman, a youth taken into custody for questioning, was released at Oregon City after telling he had come from Montana with Davis and that the first he heard of it in Portland newspapers. John Lalous, who was picked up by the police while in Friedman's company was also released.

FREIGHT AGITATION HURTS BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Constant agitation of the railroad rate subject has had a harmful effect on business in general and a tendency to retard traffic. T. C. Powell, vice president of the Erie railroad, said today in testifying at the continuation of the interstate commerce commission investigation into transportation rates. He asked the commission to hasten its investigation.

Succeeds Flood

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Representative Arthur B. House of Kentucky has been selected chairman of the democratic congressional committee to succeed the late Representative Henry D. Flood of Virginia, it was announced today.

ARRESTS DON'T DIM INDIA AGITATORS

GIRL THREW MAN OFF BRIDGE, CLAIM

DAVENPORT, Ia., Dec. 15.—Accused by a former friend of slaying Jack Meyers, whose body was recovered from the Mississippi river on October 4, by bucking him from the government bridge during a fight, Gene Morris was brought back to Davenport this morning from Peru, Ill., her home. The charge against the girl was made by Pearl Lennon, who says she was an eye witness to the fight on the bridge.

The general reputation had been that Meyers committed suicide.

TACK WEAPONS IN PACKER'S STRIKE

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 15.—Four men, said to have been trying to halt a street car carrying workmen en route to the packing plants in the zone affected by the strike in the packing industry, were arrested by police today.

Police Captain Allen reported that streets leading to the packing houses were strewn with thousands of tacks, some with heads an inch in diameter, which he presumed had been placed to handicap persons using automobiles to get to the plants.
