12-DAY VACATION FOR CITY SCHOOLS THIS CHRISTMAS

Superintendent Joseph stated today that the Christmas vacation of the public schools would begin at the close of school next Thursday afternoon and last until Tuesday, January 3. Instead of starting Wednesday afternoon as had previously been announced. This gives a vacation of 12 days duration, including 7 regular school days.

FEDERAL WARRANT FOLLOWS JOYRIDE

A warrant for the arrest of Sgt. Milton B. House, of the 51st Aero Squadron, stationed at Grassy Field, San Francisco, Calif., has been sworn out at the Federal Commissioner's office in this city by Mrs. Margie C. Womack.

The warrant charges House with the violation of the Mann Act, the allegation being that on July 4th last, Violet Womack, daughter of the plaintiff accompanied House on a motor trip to Hornbrook and that the auto party consisted of four people, Hazel Womack and Philip Easterly of Butte, Mont., owner of the car in which the trip was made, and Sgt. Milton B. House and Violet Womack.

FEDERAL ACTION ON LIQUOR VIOLATIONS

SEATTLE, Dec. 16.—Prosecution of defendants in state courts for violation of liquor laws does not constitute a bar to prosecution in federal courts where the offense charged is different, even though it is founded on the same occurrence. Federal Judge Jeremiah Neteler held in a decision handed down here today.

The court denied a plea of prior conviction in a state court in the case of four defendants charged with transporting whiskey. The state charge had been illegal possession of liquor.

***Fishing Boats Seized.**
VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 14.—Three small United States fishing boats owned in the state of Washington, which were found fishing in Canadian territorial waters last July, today were declared forfeited to the crown by Justice Martin in admiralty court. The craft will be auctioned on behalf of the dominion's department of fisheries.

The boats were seized by the cruiser Malaspina in Queen Charlotte Sound. The fishermen claimed they had inadvertently crossed the line in a dense fog.

Enforce Auto Laws
OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 14.—Rigid enforcement of the law requiring automobile owners to have 1922 licenses or license certificates by January 1 was promised today by Major Louis P. Lang, head of the state highway patrol.

Shooting in Belfast
BELFAST, Dec. 16.—(By Associated Press.) Shooting continued spasmodically in various parts of Belfast today, notably in the Newtownards roads area where a quarry laborer was wounded.

DUBLIN, Dec. 16.—(By Associated Press.) The Daily Freeman was still engaged in private consideration of the Anglo-Irish treaty at a late hour today, having remained in secret session throughout the afternoon without the issuance of any statement as to when a public meeting would be possible.

HARDING PLAN OF PEACE BLESSING TO ALL MANKIND

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(By Associated Press.) Arthur J. Haffner, head of the British delegation to the arms conference, declared today that "the great scheme initiated by President Harding" for reduction of naval armaments would benefit all the countries of the world and mostly those with the largest fleets of fighting ships.

"I am sure the burden now falling upon the people because of heavy armament would be diminished," said Mr. Haffner at a conference with newspaper men. "I believe this new arrangement has the great merits of leaving the three powers—Great Britain, the United States and Japan—safe from attack, and will prevent cut-throat competition among them in the cost of armament. It absolutely does nothing that any patriot may regret if he considers only the safety and surety of his country and the other countries participating."

"Even the richest countries of the world had to consider sooner or later the big problem of taxation growing out of the war. Looking at it only from the standpoint of finance, national and international, the example set by President Harding is difficult to overestimate. It opened a new chapter in the history of armament because it was started with the greatest and more practical example of the sacrifice of armament."

"President Harding, in his final address to the conference was aware—at the time we were not aware—that he was opening a new page in the history of the discussions of armament because it was written on the sacrifice of particular armament by the three countries concerned."

CHARGE BRUTALITY AMERICAN FORCES SANTA DOMINGO

SANTA DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, Dec. 14.—(By Associated Press.) Testimony of alleged atrocities during the American military occupation of Santo Domingo

and Haiti, such as cutting off ears of prisoners and pouring salt into their wounds, was given today by witnesses before the United States senate committee which is holding hearings on conditions during the occupation. The committee, headed by Senator McBurnie of Illinois, expects to conclude its hearings here in time to sail for the United States Friday. Other instances of alleged cruelty include the allegation by a witness that prisoner had been washed with a knife from his throat to his abdomen. The military authorities here explained that such a case had never been called to their attention and said a full investigation of this charge would be conducted by them.
