

PERU TURNS DOWN CHILEAN PROFFER FOR PLEBISCITE

LIMA, Peru, Dec. 16.—(By the Associated Press)—Dr. Alberto Salomon, minister of foreign affairs, intimated today that Peru would not accept the proposal of Chile for a plebiscite to determine the sovereignty of the provinces of Tacna and Arica. When questioned concerning the Chilean government's note he said: "The position of Peru remains firm in this question and in view of the incontrovertible justice involved and of the sympathy and moral support being received from the principal American and European countries, the territorial rights of Peru will be safeguarded from the designs of Chile without disturbing the peace of the continent. "The plan of energetic defense of Peruvian rights which the Peruvian foreign office has prepared and the promising and resolute terms in which the international conscience is being revealed, inspire confidence that this will be the case."

DEMOCRATS WANT WILSON'S VIEW ON PACIFIC TREATY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—(By the Associated Press)—The senate today is expected to vote on the ratification of the four power Pacific treaty which will not be obtained, according to expressions today of republican and democratic leaders, until the arms conference is opened and its work substantiated. In the opinion of senators today is the question of ratification or withholding judgment and public expression until the complete results of the conference have been ascertained. Reports that there was much for-ling among democrats on the conference part of the position of Senator Underwood as minority leader, might be challenged were denied vigorously today by several republican democrats, including senators who voted against Mr. Underwood in his campaign for the party leadership. Democratic senators regarded as close to former President Wilson denied that Mr. Wilson had been consulted regarding the treaty, or that his views had been made known to minority members. It was said to be probable that before the treaty discussion ended an endeavor to obtain Mr. Wilson's views would be made.

It was announced by A. D. Zander, the chairman. A message of congratulation was sent to A. C. Tombery, national president, who is receiving a just reward in his health following his successful effort of obstructing the draft, and Governor Hunt was asked to assist the members in obtaining financial assistance from the war finance corporation, which it was charged the banks were withholding.

ITALY WILLING TO RECOGNIZE RUSSIA

ROME, Dec. 16.—Italy has no objection to resuming relations with Russia through the present soviet government, under certain conditions. Premier Bonomi and Foreign Minister Torrisola told the foreign affairs committee of parliament yesterday. Those conditions, however, must guarantee Italy's interests. The committee signified its approval of the government's attitude.
