WHAT IS HAPPENING IN CHINA.

THERE is too little interest in China. The foreign policy of the United States will revolve about the Celestial Kingdom, the next ten years, and the more the American people,—particularly the people on the Pacific Coast,—know about China, the better for all concerned.

On Sunday last the Pekin cabinet fell, and yesterday Liang Shi-Ki was named to succeed Chin Yang-Peng. Unfortunately most people take far less interest in the new Chinese premier than they do in Chinese eggs, yet the former event holds far more danger to the United States than the latter.

For Liang Shi-Ki is the willing tool of General Chang Tsoo-Lin, who is the big boss of North China, with headquarters at Mukden. General Chang is a very forceful personage, with half a million troops and a strong affection for Japan. He is reported to oppose a republic and secretly favor a monarchy with himself as the power behind the throne.

According to press reports, Liang Shi has already surrounded himself with a choice bunch of Brigand chiefs, one of them Chang Chin-Yao, having been charged with the murder of Rev. W. A. Reimert, an American missionary in June, 1920.

Here then is a pretty kettle of fish. In the midst of the negotiations at Washington, looking toward release of China, from the Japanese yoke, the Pekin government falls into the hands of Chinese forces, who are pro-Japanese, anti-American, and who form the main obstacle to a proper solution of the Chinese problem.

Although it is too early for predictions, it is difficult to see how the American government can accept the new government, or at least how Chang Chin-Yao can be placed in office, without an emphatic protest.

This event, therefore, little noted in the press, may well have a most important bearing upon the outcome of the conference. No one can expect the average American citizen to become familiar with the Shi-Ki's, Young China, and Chang Yaos, but sufficient interest in Chinese affairs, to understand, revolutionary events, when they happen, will go far toward a peaceful solution of the Far East tangle, which every American desires.

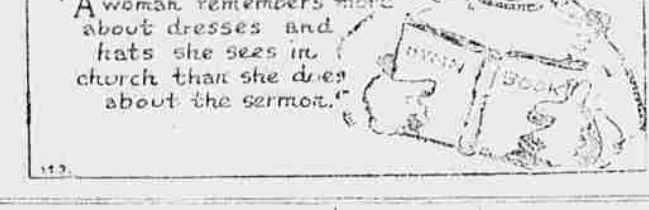
