

EXECUTION DR. BRUMFIELD PUT OFF BY APPEAL

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 23.—(Special) Judge Bingham of the circuit court has granted a certificate of probable cause following the filing of a bill of exceptions in the case of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, Roseburg dentist, who was convicted recently of first degree murder in connection with the death of Dennis Russell of Dillard, Douglas county. Brumfield is under death sentence.

The granting of the certificate automatically stays the execution of the convicted man, who was sentenced to hang in the state penitentiary here January 13.

Formal notice of appeal to the supreme court was filed by Attorney Rice Tuesday. The defense has been given 30 days to file its transcript of appeal, after which 20 days will be allowed to file briefs. The state will have ten days in which to file its reply briefs.

It was intimated here today that arguments in the case probably will not be heard until late in February or in March. Several weeks then will pass before the supreme court will hand down its opinion.

Should the supreme court refuse to reverse the verdict of the lower court it is likely that the Brumfield case will be carried to the United States supreme court on some constitutional question, the dentist's attorneys said.

Attorney Rice, who with S. A. N. Orent defended Brumfield at the time of the trial in the circuit court, appeared personally before Judge Bingham and presented the bill of exceptions.

Auto Murderer to Die CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—Harvey Church, charged with the murder of two automobile salesmen was found guilty this morning and sentenced to death. Church killed the men, Carl Asmus and Bernard Daugherty, when they delivered a car which he had arranged to buy.

HOPE FOR IRISH PEACE REVIVES ON PACT DELAY

DUBLIN, Dec. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—The decision of the Dail Eireann to adjourn until January 3, was commingled upon by all Dublin newspapers today as favorable to the chances of the Anglo-Irish treaty's ratification. A note of regret is struck by the commentators, however, over the fact that the adjournment postpones the prospect of the release of the convicted political prisoners which is expected to follow ratification of the treaty.

LONDON, Dec. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—The Dail Eireann's adjournment of further debate on the Irish peace treaty until January 3, although coming as a surprise here, was considered as favorable to the chances for ratification. By agreement between the contending factions, the Dail members will deliver no speeches touching on the treaty during the period of adjournment, nor participate in public meetings at which the treaty is discussed, but it is believed the Irish people will get together and agitate for ratification.

Various agricultural and business associations and civic bodies in Ireland are said to be planning meetings to pass resolutions favoring the treaty.

The English newspaper correspondents in Dublin emphasized the importance of the speech of Richard Mulcahy, chief of staff of the Irish republican army, in the Dail yesterday in which he advocated acceptance of the treaty. They thought that his support, together with that of such fighting men as Michael Collins, and J. J. McKelvey, assured the admission of the republican army throughout the country.

Irrigation Expert Dies. SANTA ANA, Cal., Dec. 23.—H. Clay Kellner, prominent throughout the Pacific coast as an irrigation engineer, died today at Anaheim, near here. He was 66 years old.

NEW PREMIER OF CANADA, GRANDSON OF ENGLISH REBEL

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—William Lyon Mackenzie King, premier-elect of Canada, has the distinction of heading the government of a country from which his grandfather, an opponent of the English Tory party was forced to flee as a "rebel" and serve a term in the Monroe county jail.

In December, 1837, William Lyon Mackenzie, the grandfather, gathered a mob of his followers on the outskirts of Toronto with the intention of seizing the lieutenant governor and setting up a provisional government in order to gain wider autonomy for what is now Ontario province. Misunderstandings among the leaders led to a complete failure of the revolt and Mackenzie fled to this country with a price upon his head.

In Buffalo he collected a disorderly "army" and seized and fortified Navy Island, in the river between the two countries and for some weeks troubled the Canadian frontier. This attempt also failed and in 1839 he was tried here for a breach of the neutrality laws and sentenced to eighteen months in jail, of which he served eleven.

Ten years later he was pardoned and returned to Canada.

SANITARIUM HEAD ACCUSED SWINDLING DISABLED VETERANS

WAUKESHA, Wis., Dec. 23.—Dr. J. F. Norris, executive director of the Rest Haven sanitarium at Waukesha and Roy Jackson, a patient, were arrested today by Sheriff Keebler of Waukesha county, on warrants charging sale of speculative oil stock to World War veteran patients at the institution without obtaining a permit from the state railroad commission.

Harry Harriman, of the securities division of the commission, signed the complaints on which the warrants were issued. Dr. Norris is listed as president of the Disabled Veterans' Gas and Oil company, and Mr. Jackson is named as secretary-treasurer.

E. J. Barrett, state commander of the American Legion, recently made public charges that the disabled veterans were being solicited to purchase oil stock from their meager government allotments. Dr. Norris denied the charges.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH SHORT OF RECTORS

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—The Episcopal church in the United States faces a real problem through the steady decrease in the number of recruits for the ministry, a commission appointed to investigate the subject declared in a report made public today. This situation, the commission stated, is more grave than seems to be the case with other religious bodies.

The report, prepared by the Rev. Dr. George Barthell, of Philadelphia, Dean Fosbrooke of the general seminary, New York, and Rev. Harry Nichols, said the seriousness of the situation was heightened by the rapid increase in membership. Their investigation showed a general average of only one ministerial recruit to 2251 communicants.

QUIET FUNERAL HELD FOR 'MARSE HENRY'

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 23.—"Marse" Henry Waterson content with the fullness of his life, rested today from his labors.

With only the members of his immediate family present and with the hour of the service unannounced, the body of the venerable Kentucky journalist, who died here yesterday, was placed in a vault to remain until spring, when it will be taken home to be given a final resting place beside his mother and father in Cave Hill cemetery at Louisville.

Because of the brief of his mother and sister and for fear many persons would attempt to attend the brief and simple service at a mortuary chapel, which preceded laying away of the body, Henry Waterson, Jr., arranged that the hour of the service not be made public and the family requested that there be no floral tributes.
