PECKINPAUGH TO BOSTON RED SOX FOR S. STOP SCOTT

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Ten major league ball players had new berths today as a result of trades resubmitted. Everett Scott, shortstop, and Pitchers Joe Bush and Sam Jones, of the Boston Americans go to the New York Yankees for Captain Roger Peckinpaugh. Shortstop, "Rip" Collins, Jack Quinn and Bill Piercy, all pitchers. The Boston first baseman "Stuffy" McInnis, was traded to Cleveland for Elmer Smith, right fielder, George Burns, first baseman and Joe Harris, outfielder, the latter now outlawed. If Harris is not reinstated, "Doc" Johnston, first baseman, will go to Boston. Baseball writers reported a substantial sum went to Boston in the trade with the New York club. Transfer of Peckinpaugh revived rumors last season that certain players, said to have been headed by "Babe" Ruth, wanted Peckinpaugh as manager in place of Huggins.

WAR THREATENS BETWEEN SOVIET ARMY AND TURK

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 23.—(By the Associated Press)—Friction in the relations between Soviet Russia and the Turkish nationalist government have resulted from the Turkish-French agreement and the successful Turkish-British conversations. Some anxiety is said to have been caused at Ankara by reports that the bolsheviks have reinforced the 11th army at Kars with two divisions. The Russians also are said to have ceased granting credits and supplying munitions to the nationalists. It is understood that Major Henry's British delegation at Ineboli obtained very important concessions from the nationalists, including the following: Recognition of the international control of the Dardanelles by the nationalists, giving Great Britain priority over the other allies; abandonment of the anti-British propaganda and in the Islamic countries of Asia recognition of the British right in Mesopotamia, and granting of economic privileges in Asiatic Turkey north of Mosul.

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—The Red Sox practically are a new team as the result of trades announced last night. With the passing of Everett Scott, highest ranking shortstop and holder of the record for consecutive play, the team loses the last of the regulars who brought world championships here under the management of Bill Carrigan.

The new Red Sox as Manager Hugh Duffy visualizes them in prospect, will be a stronger hitting team. The lineup as he sees it will be; Liebold, cf; Peckinpaugh, ss; Pratt, 2b; E. Smith, rf; Harris if; Burns lb; Foster 3b; Iuel c, any one of several pitchers. "We will be able to put a club on the field which will show at least seven men who bat .300 or better," Duffy said.

NO SANTA CLAUS IN COAL REGIONS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Widespread unemployment among coal miners during the last year, according to Ellis Searles, editor of the United Mine Workers Journal, will cause many hundreds of miners' children to wake up on Christmas morning to find that Santa Claus has passed them by. Thousands of children in the mining fields of West Virginia, Alabama, Texas, Tennessee and even in Central Pennsylvania are suffering, he says, for food and clothing. "There is actual starvation in the New River coal field of West Virginia where the miners have been out of employment practically all of this year," he said.

BOLSHEVIK BUDGET NEARING SOLVENCY

MOSCOW, Dec. 22.—(By the Associated Press)—The central executive committee of the soviet government today approved soviet Russia's first budget estimated on a solid

basis. It is for the period from January 1 to September 1, 1922. The government's income for that period is estimated at 1,571,000,000 gold rubles and the expenditures are estimated at 1,877,000,000 rubles, representing the smallest estimated deficit in the history of the government.
