These refer either to taking a university extension course, attending summer school, or obtaining a professional certificate, the choice being optional. Briefly stated, the object of this ruling is not only to keep the instructors from retrograding, but by way of encouraging them to advance along educational lines, in becoming more proficient. A further purpose is to obtain new ideas, and keep the mind bright by development which results from contact with other minds. A professional certificate is available from one of the state educational institutions upon submitting satisfactory evidence that two prescribed books have been read and thoroughly reviewed. In line with this availability, a work on psychology is now in the hands of the teachers study class which meets fortnightly, an additional textbook to be taken up later on.

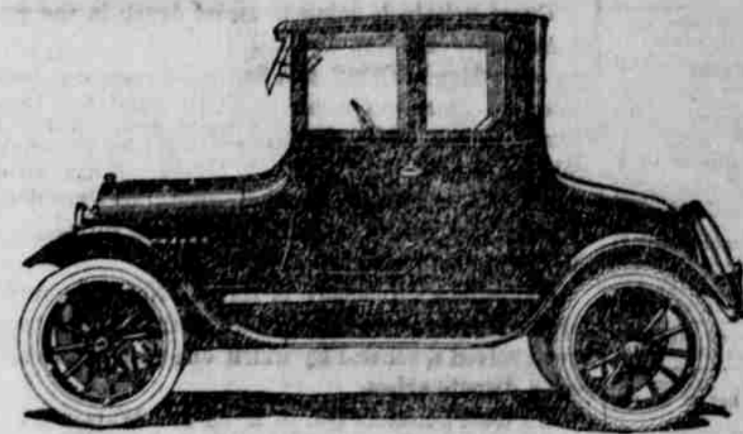
