

BIG CEREMONIAL HELD LAST NIGHT AT MASONIC LODGE

Attended by Masons from throughout Jackson and Josephine counties and assisted by visiting brothers from Grants Pass, Central Point, Jacksonville and Ashland lodges, Medford lodge No. 102, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons celebrated the opening of the new Masonic year yesterday and last evening by raising three Fellowcraft to the degree of Master Mason. Worshipful Master Elect J. F. Lawrence presided.

Degree work commenced at 2 o'clock p. m. and continued until dinner time when an elaborate spread was served by a committee of Eastern Star ladies led by Mrs. James R. W. Greig. After dinner the lodge resumed its labors completing the work that made C. W. Martin, N. A. Oolman and C. C. Purman master Masons.

Assisting Worshipful Master Lawrence were the newly installed officers of Medford lodge. They are: Glenn Fabrick, senior warden; Paul Hansen, junior warden; J. E. Edmiston, senior deacon; Gordon Coddling, junior deacon; Oliver D. Pruzer, senior steward; John Denver, junior steward. The work of the degree team under the leadership of James R. W. Greig and Howard A. Hill drew considerable praise from the visiting craftsmen.

Following the degree work, Rev. W. H. Hamilton, pastor of the local Episcopal church and a keen student of ancient craft masonry, delivered an address on the degree work that brought rounds of applause. Glenn Fabrick and Rev. J. L. EXPECT MOTOR RACERS TO REACH MEDFORD NEW YEARS, 9 A. M.

A motorcycle endurance run from Eugene to Medford and return, has been staged by the Eugene Motorcycle club. The riders leave Eugene at midnight on December 31, at five-minute intervals, and are due to arrive at Medford New Year's morning during the period beginning at nine o'clock.

Checking stations along the road will check the speed of the riders, which is not allowed to exceed an average of 25 miles per hour. The Grants Pass check station is at the Fashion garage, and Deputy Sheriff Millard of Medford will have charge of the checking at that point. The station at Medford is to be at the Gaylord Cycle shop, where the riders will have about three hours interval to thaw out and assimilate some hot coffee and sandwiches, before tackling the return lap.

Wells Bennett, of Los Angeles, who has been riding motorcycle races for 14 years, will be in the run, and he called at the Gaylord shop on Friday morning, on his way back to Eugene from a view of the road. He said that it will be a pretty stiff race. "There can't be much high speed stuff on this race," he said. "It goes over too many mountains, and there is almost sure to be fog and rain. When you go fifteen miles an hour in a fog it seems like forty—and you always meet a Ford or a wagon without any lights at the sharp turns. Safety first for me."

About twenty riders are entered for the race, from Eugene, and neighboring points, as well as from Portland and other more distant cities.

Considerable interest among Jackson County motorists is centering about the new race track in the fair grounds, and there is likely to be a tuning up of old motors and breaking in of new ones during the coming months in preparation for the possible racing events. Attention of the whole town will be centered at Medford when these races are announced.

TRAINS SNOW BOUND IN NEW BRUNSWICK

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 31.—Five trains are snowbound in the Nova Scotia section of the Canadian National railways and there is a complete stoppage of traffic between Spring Hill Junction and Truro as a result of the severe snowstorm in Nova Scotia.

One train is reported to be completely covered over with huge snow drifts while the other four, including last night's Maritime express from Halifax are stalled near London.

The situation is one of the worst experienced by railroad men for many winters.
