N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Moderate dealings and uneven price movements featured the close of the year on the Stock Exchange. Few leaders of the railway and industrial division registered more than nominal changes. Interest and activity centered in speculative oils, steels, equipments, chemicals and specialties, comprising the mail order and textile groups. Advances of one to two points in some of those shares were balanced by reactions of the same extent but the market steadied on short covering in the later dealings. Sales approximated 400,000 shares.
The bond market was dull and featureless.
Forecast of Year
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The last week of the year in the stock market presented no change from the recent uncertain drift of prices, although the demand for investment issues lost none of its recent strength.
Extensive selling to adjust income tax losses served to keep the stock list within narrow bounds. The only striking exceptions were equipments, oils and specialties controlled by pools.
Call loans fluctuated between 4 1/2 and 6 per cent. But the greater part of the money was placed at 5 per cent. Time accommodations were limited to the shorter dates, although some long time commercial loans were made on 5 per cent basis.
Forecasts of the coming year were mainly hopeful, observers of general business and industrial conditions expecting them to be better, many of the larger systems showing marked gains in net income. Advances from steel, iron and copper centers also were en-

ouraging, and improvement was seen in the increased production of textiles, rubbers and leathers.
Prize Get \$9,000,000
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—An appropriation for the enforcement of prohibition during the next fiscal year amounting to \$9,000,000, perhaps slightly more, as compared with the treasury department's request for an appropriation of \$10,000,000, will be recommended to the house by its appropriations committee. It was said today by committee members.
