WILLS AND TATE TO FIGHT IT OUT ON FRIDAY NIGHT

PORTLAND, Jan. 4.—Harry Wills and Bill Tate, the giant colored heavyweights, are going to settle the question of supremacy next Friday evening at the Milwaukee boxing commission in a scheduled 10-round contest.

The bout will be free to those who attended Monday afternoon's fiasco. Spectators who retained the stubs of their tickets will be given the same seats at Friday night's contest. Other spectators, including those occupying general admission seats, will be taken care of under the first come, first served rule.

The decision to re-stage the contest was reached following a lengthy discussion between the managers of the principals, Referee Loutitt, the members of the Milwaukee boxing commission, Dr. E. C. McFarland, chairman of the Portland boxing commission.

George Moore, manager of the Milwaukee arena, will arrange a preliminary card of three or four bouts and will pay the participants out of his own pocket.

The return bout is being staged to give the fans a run for their money. The principle concerned admit that the fans did not get a run for their money, and the statements made at the conference Tuesday morning bring to light a misunderstanding over the instructions.

The original purses of the boxers will be paid over to them following their return engagement Friday night.

This will probably be the first time in the history of the ring where two battlers of the calibre of these have agreed to battle out the question of supremacy without compensation other than the original purse.

Tom Loutitt, who refereed the fiasco Monday afternoon, has been agreed upon as the referee for the coming bout.

ALL RECORDS FOR BUSINESS FAILURE BROKEN IN 1921

Liquidation in the form of failure was heavy in 1921, both number and liabilities exceeding any previous records. For this, low prices of farm products in the country and restricted employment in the cities—reduced purchasing power, in short—were mainly responsible. Other contributory causes were the perpendicular drop in values of goods, many concerns finding themselves hung up with unsalable products. Back of all this, however, it must be noted that in the past two years were enormously large, 11 per cent over 1919, and 16 per cent as compared with 1915, a preceding year of stress with which comparisons will naturally be made. For eleven months the number of failures exceeded those of 1915 by four-tenths of one per cent. Compared with 1919, the most favorable year as regards failures there is record of since 1881, failures were three times as large. Liabilities for eleven months, \$663,404,163, were just double those of 1920 and 160 per cent larger than in 1915. But the outlook for 1922 might be termed fair and warmer.—Bradstreet's Review.

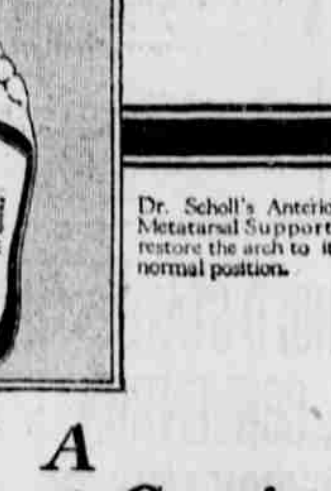
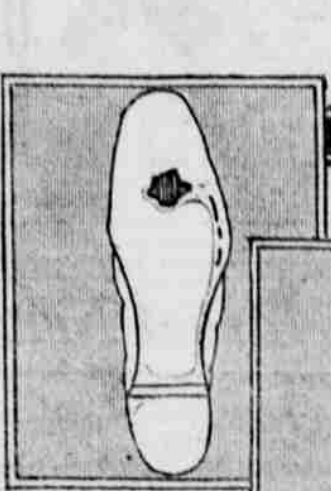
