Political leaders from every county in the state came to Philadelphia within the last few days to do honor to the late chief and not one was invited to the bachelor home of the senator, where many political conferences have been held.

Questions had been asked why the family desired secrecy in the burial and the answer of close political friends was that Penrose hated pomp and ceremony and that it probably was his wish that he be buried as simply and with as little commotion as possible. It is said to have been a tradition in the Penrose family, which is one of the oldest in the city that all funerals of the members be strictly private.

GRANTS PASS IS GIVEN INJUNCTION AGAINST TWOHY RD

GRANTS PASS, Jan. 6.—A temporary injunction has been issued by Judge F. M. Collins against the California and Coast railroad company, the Title and Trust company, and Twohy Brothers, preventing them from in any way encumbering the railroad or railroad property, and from leasing, placing, selling or otherwise disposing of any bonds whatever, which are or may become a lien covering any of the railroad property. The order, which further prevents them from issuing or executing any mortgage or lien, is now in full force and effect.

The city of Grants Pass, in bringing the action, alleges that pursuant to the provisions of the contract, the railroad company contracted 4 1/2 miles of track to Water Creek, on which extension it has actually expended a sum approximating \$90,000 and has also failed to pay the city the sum of \$200,000 provided by the city for construction of the railroad at municipal expense. Bonds, bearing 6 per cent interest, were issued by the city to cover the amount expended on the first 10 miles of the road.

It is further alleged that the railroad company has wholly failed to pay any portion of the semi-annual interest on the \$200,000 bonds, and that there has been no portion of the railroad under construction other than the 4 1/2 miles already completed. The city states that it has received no benefit from the extension of the 4 1/2 miles.

Notwithstanding the representations of the defendant, the California and Oregon Coast railroad, and the guarantee of the Twohy Brothers company, the city in its complaint alleges that the railroad company was, at the time of the execution of the contract and at all times since, financially unable to construct said railroad, nor has it made arrangements for its financing. Even if the said contract were not in default and the period for the construction of said railroad had not elapsed, it is held that in any event, the said railroad is wholly and financially unable to complete said railroad or any portion of it, and has definitely abandoned all intention of doing so.

An agreement was entered into between the City of Grants Pass and the California and Oregon Coast Railroad company on June 26, 1915, granting property, building, right of way, etc., along the proposed route, the railroad to purchase the franchise from the city within three and one-half years from the date on which the property was transferred in the direction of the Illinois river to a point at or near Waldo, about 48 miles from Grants Pass.

It was further agreed that in case the United States became involved in war with any foreign nation that the time within which any act shall be done shall be extended for an additional period equal to the time between the declaration of war and the conclusion of peace.

ARRESTED FOR ROBBERY OF FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 5.—William Kerfoot, wanted in Kansas City for the alleged theft of two sacks of registered mail, containing currency amounting to \$15,000, was arrested here by local detectives and is being held today pending advice from postal authorities.

Kerfoot is said to have stolen the sacks while acting as mail clerk in Kansas City fifteen years ago. Under many aliases he eluded capture until traced to Portland, Ore., several weeks ago.
