The United States veterans' bureau is now using 5000 schools throughout the country for training the ex-service men and 7000 institutions for placement training. The bureau has approximately 101,000 men receiving vocational training and about 301,000 men awaiting assignment. 425,000 men have registered for vocational education. Rehabilitation and education will be the bureau's greatest problem having to do with the future of the ex-service men. At present 41 per cent of the entire ex-soldier population taking vocational training are in placement training in shops and manufacturing plants. Six thousand of the beneficiaries have been rehabilitated, but not 1000 are actually engaged in the employment which they selected, or were selected for them, as their vocational objective.
