

### RESUME DRIVE TO SECURE A COUNTRY CLUB

Concrete action on the part of the Jackson County Golf club committee is expected, within the next ten days, to determine the feasibility of the organization and financing an up to date golf club in the county.

Under the plans that the committee is working on all money subscribed is made payable to trustee banks in Jackson county to be held by the banks until the full amount necessary for the completion of the undertaking, free from all debts, has been actually paid into the banks in cash.

The provision is made in the contracts that unless the full amount of money necessary for the project is subscribed by April 1st that the trustee banks are to return all contracts to the original signers and the undertaking will then be abandoned for this year.

The organization of the club, expenditure of funds, location of the grounds to be utilized, rules and regulations governing the management and conduct of the organization are all made subject to a majority vote to be taken at a meeting to be called after the full amount necessary to finance the organization has been subscribed.

The charter membership fee has been placed at \$100, the first payments on which are due April 1st. After the charter membership has been signed up and completed the initiation fee will be raised to such an amount as may be decided upon by the organization.

"There is no desire on the part of any of the committee to induce the people of this community to finance a golf club if they are not acquainted with the benefits to be derived from such an institution," said one of the members of the soliciting committee today. "The question has been asked so often and progressive residents have been making excuses and alibis to tourists and non-residents for so long why Medford is behind nearly all other towns of its size in the west in this one particular that when we were appointed on this committee we felt it a duty to give the people the opportunity of having a golf club if they want it. Golf clubs are an asset to any community fortunate enough to possess a citizenship of a standard able to appreciate and support it. Medford and Jackson county now have a chance to have a club if the people want one."

Contracts can be signed at the Torgery, McCurdy Insurance Agency, Vernon Vawter, T. E. Daniels' office or any of the Medford banks. Inasmuch as the work of the committee is a public spirited one involving a considerable sacrifice of time and effort the public is asked to cooperate in indicating its desires in the matter by calling and signing the contracts.

Mr. Jones was an active member of the subordinate lodge, the Rebekah and the Encampment branches of the I. O. O. F. at Marysville, Cal., and served in the world war in the 159th Infantry.

Funeral services will be held at the parlors of Weeks Conger company at 2:30 Wednesday, January 11th.

Interment in the family plot in Central Point cemetery under auspices of the Medford lodge of Odd Fellows.

### GRIFFITH NAMED IRISH HEAD

Collins moved that Arthur Griffith be appointed president of the Daill. The Irish nation had no children, said Collins, who proceeded to tell the Daill that he had received a letter from the proprietor of the Cork Examiner, saying the management of that newspaper had been held up this morning at 2 o'clock and compelled to publish a proclamation. Collins said he called such methods "black and tan methods" whoever employed them.

De Valera Walks Out Eamonn DeValera and his followers walked out while the vote was being taken, in protest against the nomination of Griffith. Speaker MacNiel put the motion for Griffith's election and he was unanimously chosen.

Cabinet Appointed Griffith moved the appointment of the following:

- Minister of finance, Michael Collins.
- Foreign affairs, George Gavan Duffy.
- Home affairs, Eamonn J. Duggan.
- Local government, William T. Cosgrave.
- Economic affairs, Brian O'Higgins.
- Defense, Richard Mulcahy.

Griffith's Record Arthur Griffith was one of the founders of the Sinn Fein government and has been among the foremost leaders directing its activities. He was formerly an editor at Dublin and later established the paper United Irishmen, followed by the Sinn Fein, and then the Nationality.

In October, 1917, he was elected presiding officer at the opening of the Sinn Fein conference in Dublin. During the peace conference at Paris in 1919 he was chosen as an Irish delegate to go to Paris and present the Irish case but failure to get a safe conduct prevented his attendance.

In July, 1919, he was elected acting president of the Irish national assembly in the absence of Eamonn De Valera in the United States. Later, in October, 1919, he was elected one of the permanent vice presidents of the Sinn Fein organization. He was arrested in Dublin in November, 1920, and spent seven months in Mountjoy prison.

During his imprisonment, he issued a message to the Irish people as to the conduct of the Sinn Fein organization. An attempt was made to rescue him from prison but the armored car used for that purpose failed to carry out the plan.

The return of DeValera from America was attributed to Griffith's imprisonment as Mr. DeValera on his return resumed the active direction of Sinn Fein affairs. Early in June last there were reports of a London conference to which Irish leaders would be invited. Griffith's release from prison followed on June 21, last.

Griffith went to London in July, and later was appointed chairman of the Sinn Fein mission in the negotiations which culminated on December 6 last, with the signing of the treaty between Great Britain and Ireland, which has now been approved by the British parliament and the Daill Eireanna.

Halifax Schooner Lost. HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 10.—The schooner Flora A., 70 tons, of Harbor Baffet, N. E., with her crew of six men, was given up for lost today in maritime circles. She left Georgetown, P. E. I., for Harbor Baffet and nothing has been heard from her since.

Improve Coos Bay. WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Improvement of Coos Bay harbor and Isthmus slough, Oregon, at an estimated cost of \$3,310,000 was recommended today by army engineers.

### POLITICAL POT FOR MAY PRIMARY BEGINS TO BOIL

The spring primary will be held Friday, May 19, and will be for the election of members of the legislature and governor in state offices, and one county commissioner and a circuit judge in the county offices, all other county offices, holding over two years more. There will be no dearth of candidates for any position, from present indications.

For governor there are any number of citizens willing to bear the burden of being the chief executive of Oregon, most prominently locally being C. E. (Pop) Gate, mayor of Medford, who has been in Portland for the last week erecting political fences. The mayor has not announced his candidacy, but it is no secret he has inclinations that way. Governor Olcott is also apt to be a contender for re-election.

For the legislature, the names of Ben Sheldon, present representative, Vernon H. Vawter, the present incumbent, and Ralph H. Cowgill, farmer and engineer are mentioned. Mr. Sheldon will probably seek the senate, vacated by Senator C. M. Thomas, when he announced his candidacy for circuit judge. Mr. Vawter and Mr. Cowgill are prospective candidates for the lower house. This is the initial appearance of Vawter in the political arena, but Cowgill was a runner up at the last primary. None of the above have made an announcement of their political intentions.

Senator C. M. Thomas has announced his retirement from the legislative halls to try for the judicial robes, and there promises to be some excitement in the race. The position embraces the districts of Jackson and Josephine counties. The present incumbent, Judge F. M. Calkins, recently announced that he will retire, despite the earnest appeals of friends in both counties to make the race for re-election. He has made an enviable record on the bench.

Political gossip links the name of Attorney Gus Newbury for the place. Attorney H. E. Norton from Grants Pass is also mentioned, and it is expected an Ashland lawyer will throw his hat in the ring.

The election of one county commissioner is also slated for the primary from the district now represented by Commissioner James Owens. It is not known whether Owens will be a candidate for re-election or not. A prospective candidate for the berth is Thomas Simpson, merchant, of Ashland, who served half a term. Frank Brown of Eagle Point is also being urged by his friends to make the race, but Mr. Brown balks at the idea.

The open season for filing for office starts March 19, sixty days before the primary, and closes April 19, a month before the vote. The law also requires the filing of a petition signed by taxpayers, and depositing of a fee before April 19th.

### GOVERNOR OLCOTT STARTS FIGHT ON DRUG TRAFFIC

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—Plans for the official fight of the state of Oregon against the illicit traffic in narcotics are being formulated here today by Governor Olcott and members of the state boards of health and pharmacy in joint conference.

Frank S. Ward, secretary of the pharmacy board, and Dr. Frederick Stricker, secretary of the board of health, have both prepared reports on the sale and use of narcotics in Oregon at the request of Governor Olcott, and the discussions here are centering around these reports.

Today's conferences are in the nature of a preliminary session to a meeting in Portland tomorrow, to which Governor Olcott has invited public officials from all parts of the state who are interested in suppression of the drug traffic.

### 62.5 MILES OF MACADAM BUILT IN JACKSON, 1921

During 1921 in Jackson county, 62.5 miles of macadam roads were constructed, and 64 miles graded according to figures compiled by the county court, the expenditures for the construction, totaling approximately \$600,000 divided equally among state, federal and county appropriations.

The road work plans for the coming year include the following, under the market road bill, a county levy of 1.5 mills being matched by the state.

The expenditure of \$5000 on the Dead Indian road from Ashland to Lake of the Woods, an aid alike to tourists, campers and farmers.

The expenditure of \$15,000 from Eagle Point up Butte creek towards Fish Lake and Lake of the Woods, including improvements on the Lake creek and Little Butte forks.

The expenditure of \$20,000 on the Butte Falls roads from the Crater Lake highway up Reese creek, as far as the money allowed will go, and graveling the worse stretch on the top of hills, that have long been the motive for petitions by residents to the county court.

The expenditure of \$20,000 on graveling the Jacksonville-Ruch road, and from Ruch down the Big Apple gate as far as the appropriation will allow.

The expenditure of \$2000 on the improvement of the road in the Sardinia creek district.

This work will entail the expending of about \$63,000 half borne by the state.

Other prospective road work includes the survey of the Applegate road, Ruch to Square creek, and the calling of bids for the construction of the Trail-Prospect section of the Crater Lake highway, which will be under the direction of the federal post road authorities, with the expenditures divided between the state and federal authorities. Government and state engineers recently made a survey, for the purpose of calling for bids.

All the market roads to be constructed will be on a state survey, standard grade, and slightly narrower than standard.
