The state bonus commission intends selling \$10,000,000 of bonds on January 15, which will be the first chunk of bonds disposed of under the bonus act. This money is to be used in the payment of bonuses to former service men of Oregon. Almost 50 per cent of the applications to the commission are for a cash bonus instead of a long-time loan, which means that approximately \$5,000,000 in cash will be in circulation as soon as the service men can get hold of it. What interest the bonds will bear is not known, as the buyers will name the interest rate in their bids. The big block of bonds so soon to be dumped on the market had an influence on the bidding for the state highway bonds disposed of yesterday. —Portland Oregonian.
