IT NEVER HAPPENED BEFORE.

WHO has won, Hughes or Kato, asks a down—Portland is now down—state contemporary? This is contrary to all rules of poker but is nevertheless true. At the Washington conference stands today, both Japan and the United States have secured what they wanted, both are happy, both have won.

The reason is they didn't want the same thing. Hughes came to the conference, like the excellent lawyer he is, with his case prepared. He wanted first a genuine and sweeping reduction of naval armaments, he wanted second, the end of the Anglo-Jap treaty, he wanted third a recognition of the open door in China, and a foundation, merely a foundation, for more friendly relations between China and Japan.

Kato came to the conference, like the excellent diplomat he is, with his plan not outlined at all. His action was to depend upon circumstances. He was to play a waiting game, and only jump in when an opening appeared. But while he was determined to give only what he had to give, he was also determined to get at all costs the recognition of Japan as a world power, her inclusion in whatever agreements might be reached, and an end to the threat of Anglo-Saxon hostility and Japanese isolation.

Now Kato is probably more jubilant than Hughes, for Kato expected less than Hughes expected, or to express it in another way, he feared more than Hughes had any reason to fear.

It is not generally known, but nevertheless true, that when the Japanese delegation left Yokohama they were scared pink. Not only did they fear an Anglo-American alliance against them, but they actually feared violence. That was why they sailed for Seattle instead of San Francisco, and included several strong armed secret service men in their entourage. No one was more surprised than Baron Kato when he found he could get out at any station along the line and walk through the crowds in Washington without having a brick shied at his head.

It is easy to understand from this why the Baron is so overjoyed. It is not that he got so much, but that he expected so little. He lost the most valuable asset Japan ever had,—the alliance with England,—he was not allowed to even bring up California exclusion, he was forced to scrap a large part of the navy he had himself built up, and he retreated farther from the twenty-one demands, than any one in the Chinese delegation ever expected he would but he DID GET what he wanted. Hughes got what he wanted, and with the certainty of another conference, will get more.

So all in all it has been a delightful party. Everyone is satisfied. It never happened before, it may never happen again, but it really did happen this time.
