AGED FATHER IS KILLED, FIGHTING FOR DAUGHTER

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Jan. 12.—The theory that William Richwine, 74 years old, an invalid, was slain while attempting to protect his daughter in law, Mrs. Clara Richwine, 34, from an attack by robbers, was advanced today by police investigating the finding of the two persons shot to death late yesterday in the family home here. Authorities announced their only clues were those of a neighbor, who said he saw an automobile with two men alongside and an automobilist who declared two men stopped him and said a woman had been killed at the Richwine home. Mrs. Richwine's nude body was found with a bullet hole in the head and wrapped in a blanket on the dining room table. The police said the clothing of the woman was missing. The man's body was found in the basement. Mr. Richwine, husband of the woman, ascribed the mysterious tragedy to robbery. He said jewelry valued at \$1,100 was missing.

R. R. CLERKS STILL FIGHTING FOR AN EIGHT HOUR DAY

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Extra pay for overtime work and the eight hour day are the principal points sought by railway clerks in controversies over the rules of the clerks' national agreement which were taken up for consideration by the United States railway labor board today. The board expected to complete its draft within two weeks and promulgation of a new set of rules is looked for by February 1. Forty-four roads submitted disagreements with the clerks on rule 57, calling for time and one-half pay after eight hours' work, which the clerks wish continued. Eight roads have agreed with their clerks to pay pro-rata time after eight hours, but other carriers are asking no extra pay for the ninth hour, pro-rata for the tenth, and time and one-half only after ten hours. Monthly and weekly bases of pay are sought by about two-thirds of the roads involved, as opposed to a daily rate basis which the employees ask to be continued.

LEGION IS ASKED TO PRESENT BONUS CASE CHAMBERS COMMERCE

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—National Commander Hanford MacNider of the American Legion issued orders last night to legion posts to present the case of adjusted compensation for ex-soldiers before the chambers of commerce in every city in the United States in connection with the referendum on that question now being conducted by those bodies. The campaign is to begin immediately, the chamber of commerce of the United States which submitted the referendum to its members, has set the time limit in the voting at February 21. Legion leaders, dwelling upon the fight the national chamber has waged upon the pending bill, declare the measure has not been understood. Commander MacNider in a letter to Joseph H. DeFrees, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States which was made public last night said that "opposition to this measure lies principally in ignorance of what the bill really calls for. There is a cash payment option, it is true, but it is taken care of by small payments, several months apart. The other four features of the legion bill (insurance, vocational aid, or assistance in acquiring land or a home) your organization does not mention."

PRINCESS MARIE TO MARRY KING ALEX

BELGRADE, Jan. 12.—The engagement of King Alexander to the Princess Marie, second daughter of King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Roumania, was announced today. Princess Marie is 22 years of age. She was reported engaged to Alexander, who was then prince regent of Jugo-Slavia, in September, 1920. King Alexander, who is the second son of the late King Peter of Serbia, is in his 31st year. He is visiting King Ferdinand and Queen Marie of Roumania at their chateau at Sigm.

JAPS SMUGGLING IMITATION SCOTCH PORTS OF OREGON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—A list of liquor smuggling vessels operating in American waters has been compiled by federal authorities for use in combating rum runners. It was said today at prohibition headquarters. The list now comprises about 20 American and foreign ships. Japanese rum runners, who are smuggling imitation Scotch whiskey into Oregon ports, are aided by radio instructions from shore, according to a report from Federal Prohibition Director Joseph A. Linville at Portland, Ore. "Steamship agencies," the report said, "have promised their co-operation in enforcing the prohibition laws on ships coming into Oregon ports. "Japanese steamship companies on the contrary are sending wireless messages to sea for the protection of ships carrying imitation Scotch whiskey into this country."

OPERATORS GUILTY IN CELILO WRECK

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12.—Exonerating the member of the train crews from responsibility for the head-on collision of two passenger trains at Celilo, Ore., December 1, in which seven persons were killed and 73 injured, the state public service commission today reported the findings of its investigation into the wreck. Disregard of the ordinary rules of "safety first" by operating officials of the Oregon-Washington railroad in allowing train No. 12 to run over the eastbound track without proper safeguards is blamed for the wreck.
