MINNESOTA DICKERS FOR HUGO BEZDEK

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 12.—A group of alumni of the University of Minnesota today were reported to be considering what steps may be taken to secure the services of Hugo Bezdek, athletic director at Penn State as head football coach at Minnesota.

Both Bezdek and Fred Laehring, athletic director at the University of Minnesota late yesterday concluded conferences with Lotus D. Coffman, president of the university. They left for their homes without any decisions being reached. It is said.

The next move of interest is a deal whereby Wm. Von der Hellen has sold his hardware and drug store to our other hardware man, Roy Ashpole and Thomas F.
