MAHATMA GANDHI EXPLAINS POLICY NON-RESISTANCE

CALCUTTA—Mahatma Gandhi has issued a statement deprecating violence and resistance to constituted authority, and explaining his theory of resistance by non-violence. The statement was issued as a result of the Bombay rioting upon the arrival of the Prince of Wales, in which seven were killed and 200 injured. Gandhi's statement says:

"The hope of reviving mass civil disobedience has, in my opinion, once more been dashed to pieces. The atmosphere for mass civil disobedience is absent. It is not enough that such atmosphere is to be found at Bardoli, and therefore it may go side by side with violence in Bombay. This is impossible; neither Bardoli nor Bombay can be treated as separate unconnected units. They are a part of one great undivisible whole. It was possible to disregard Malabar, but it was not possible to ignore Bombay.

"We were, under the pledge, bound to protect the person of the prince from any harm or insult, and we broke that pledge inasmuch as any one of us assaulted or injured a single European or any other who took part in the welcome. I can't shirk my own responsibility. I am more instrumental than any other in bringing in a spirit of revolt. I find myself not fully capable of controlling and disciplining that spirit.

"The working committee will have to devote its attention to the situation and consider in the light thereof whether mass civil disobedience can be at all encouraged until we have obtained complete control over the masses. I have, personally, come deliberately to the conclusion that mass civil disobedience cannot be started for the present. I confess my inability to conduct the campaign to a successful issue unless, completely, a non-violence atmosphere is generated among the people."

In the presidency of Bengal, the non-cooperation movement has been suppressed upon a notification issued by the governor in council, making illegal all non-cooperation organizations such as the Bengal Non-Cooperation Volunteer corps, Central Mohammedan Volunteer corps and the Congress Committee corps.

This was followed by a series of raids by the police in different parts of Calcutta and suburbs. The police searched four Congress and three Khilafat offices, seizing a large number of documents, papers and books and removing them to the central police station. No arrests were made.

PeKin Warships Sail. SHANGHAI, Jan. 13.—Seven warships of the Peking government's navy have left here for Shanghai, near Yangchow, in the province of Kiang-Su, the commanders announcing their intention of collecting the salt duties there to obtain money with which to buy food for their sailors.

GAS EXPLOSION PARTS CABLE AT TRIGONIA WELL

Last Tuesday, the 9th inst., while drilling at the Trigonía well with a full head of water standing to within 114 feet of surface, a very heavy gas eruption occurred, according to report of the Trigonía officials, that shot the drilling tools up past the drilling cable inside of the casing, causing the cable to kink, and with the down stroke of the tools and up stroke of the walking beam caused the cable to part, and leave the tools in the bottom of the well, for which special fishing tools had to be prepared. However, all is again safely out, and drilling resumed.
