HARDING PROMISES SUPPORT TO CANAL CHICAGO TO SEA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Negotiations of a treaty between the United States and Great Britain looking toward improvement of the St. Lawrence river between Montreal and Lake Ontario, so as to provide a deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic ocean may be expected to be undertaken soon, it was said today at the White House.

The arrangement of such a treaty is recommended in the report of the international joint commission transmitted yesterday by the president to congress. Conclusion of such a convention would be the first step toward making possible the long discussed lake-to-ocean waterway. President Harding, it was also said, at the White House, is much interested in the project and intends to lend his influence toward early, diplomatic efforts.

JURY DISAGREES IN THE PORTLAND AUTO CASE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—The jury trying Miss Naß Johnson on a charge of involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death of Donald Foster, aged 8, who was killed by an automobile driven by the young woman October 7, disagreed and was discharged today.
