## TO FORCE SECRET TREATIES, CHINA OUT INTO OPEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The Far Eastern committee of the Washington conference today adopted two resolutions dealing with Chinese railways and then began consideration of the status of existing commitments in China, the last item on the Chinese section of the conference agenda.

One of the railroad resolutions adopted, presented by Sir Auckland Geddes of the British delegation, pledges the powers and China against "unfair discrimination" in railroad rates and facilities. The other, by Secretary Hughes, expresses hope in eventual unification of the Chinese roads under Chinese control. Both were adopted substantially in the form presented yesterday, although a few minor changes were made.

When the subject of existing commitments was taken up it was suggested that all the nations represented furnish the committee with a list of treaties and agreements relating to China and the proposal was agreed tentatively. The lists furnished are to cover secret as well as public understandings.

Although it was said that the agreement to furnish this information was only tentative in character, most of the delegates indicated afterward that they expected the list to be in the hands of the secretary-general of the conference before the committee resumes its sessions tomorrow afternoon.

## DOG LICENSES ARE NOW DUE JACKSON COUNTY

The circuit court of Marion county has upheld the dog license law and the county clerks have been instructed by the attorney general's office to proceed with the collection thereof. The law requires the payment of \$1 license for male dogs, and \$2.50 for females. County Clerk Florry has received 500 licenses and collars for use.

The penalty for non-payment of the dog license is death to the dog, and the sheriff maintains that a dog is entitled to life, liberty, and the pursuit of cats, as long as he does not go mad, and bite somebody. Last year Sheriff Terrill, flatfootedly refused to have any canine blood on his hands, and feels the same way about it this year. If any dogs are killed it will not be by the sheriff, who sees no sense in being mean just to knock a dollar out of somebody.

The law is applicable alike to city and country dogs, the owners of city dogs claiming they are hit twice in the pocketbook, once by the city license, and once by the state. On the other hand, the country dog owners say their dogs perform good work in ridding the world of pests, guard the kids, are fairly good company, any place, or time, and behave themselves when they come to town. They hoot the contention of shepherds that dogs kill sheep, and furthermore, argue, that a dog thus inclined, will do the deed, as quick with a license, as without one.

Last year dog owners did not tear out any doors in the courthouse trying to get a license, as only 500 were permitted.

It is estimated that the canine population of the county is in the neighborhood of 2,500, including about a dozen pups, with blue blood in their systems.

## 2 TRUCK DRIVERS FROZEN TO DEATH

CASPER, Wyo., Jan. 19.—Officers from the sheriff's office started north on the Salt Creek highway this morning to investigate a report that two truck drivers had been frozen to death last night. Temperature had moderated this morning after reaching a minimum of ten below zero. Temperatures in Wyoming ranged from 19 to 48 below last night, the latter reported from Worland.

## GAME LAW BREAKER GETS JAIL SENTENCE

Dewey Fitzgerald, the rancher and miner of the Little Applegate section, a married man with children, who was placed under arrest by District Game Warden Pat Dalley several days ago, pleaded guilty to the charge of having a quantity of venison in his possession out of season before Acting Justice of the Peace Farrell in this city yesterday.

A sentence of 30 days in jail and a fine of \$50 was imposed, and Fitzgerald because of his family was paroled during good behavior.
