MEDFORD PEOPLE PROMINENT IN PORTLAND NEWS

The following items from the Oregonian Hotel column demonstrates that Medford is figuring largely in Portland news just at present:

Gus Newbury, an attorney of Medford, is among the arrivals at the Imperial. When the primaries are held next May Mr. Newbury's name will probably be on the ballot, in Jackson county as a candidate for the republican nomination for circuit judge to succeed Judge Calkins, who is about to retire from the bench.

J. G. Gagnon, registered at the Hotel Oregon, owns the railroad which operates between Medford and Jacksonville. Also he has a mill and box factory in Medford and is now filling an order for a great number of orange boxes for the California market.

Lumber activities and irrigation are the two big things which are interesting Medford people just now. reports S. B. Smith, newspaper man of Medford and member of the republican state executive committee for Jackson county. "The Pacific & Eastern railroad, which runs from Medford to Butte Falls, is being reconstructed and is to be extended 12 miles into the Four-bit timber which Mr. Olds, owner of the road and the timber, bought some time ago. The Brownlee Lumber company has about completed the mill which it has been erecting for nearly a year and the mill is waiting on the extension of the railroad, for the Brownlee plant will cut for Mr. Olds and Brownlee. The plant will give employment to several hundred men. The timber to be tapped is what is said to be the largest body of pine in the state—timber in which an ax has never been set. The Medford Irrigation district has announced that it will have water this year for 10,000 acres. The water is to come from Mount McLoughlin. All things considered, the prospects for Medford's immediate future are particularly bright." Mr. Smith is registered at the Benson.

Jackson county is going to have a real fair grounds, with automobile races, horse races and substantial permanent buildings, states J. E. Mason of Medford, a visitor in Portland. "The county levied a tax of 1 mill for a year, raising \$10,000 for the fair ground, an expert from California has laid out the speedway for automobiles and there will be a half-mile track for horses within the speedway circle, and inside the track will be an aviation landing field. It is believed that arrangements can be made so that Jackson county fair can be on the circuit and the same automobile racers who appear in southern California will drive their cars in Medford. A similar arrangement may be made with respect to horse races. Jackson county is an ideal place for wintering horses and some very fine animals are being kept there this winter."

U. S. ARMY ADOPTS FRENCH 75'S AS WAR EQUIPMENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(By Associated Press.) Training of regular troops with American model 75 millimeter guns will be discontinued and training with the French 75's will be extended to artillery units of the regular establishment, the National Guards and officers of the reserves.

The French guns have been accepted as the standard light gun for the regular army and the National Guard, and in time of national emergency would be issued to the organized reserves. "The American 75 millimeter gun," says an official communication issued by the office of the chief of field artillery, "is an experimental split trail gun, with which several regiments have heretofore been equipped. The shortage of field artillery troops makes it inadvisable to continue further experimental work with this gun."

In extending the instruction to organized reserve officers, the letter says, a new departure in army training has been made.

Heretofore courses have been maintained for regular officers and for National Guard officers," it says. "We are now inaugurating the systematic instruction of the third component of the army of the United States—the organized reserves."

REICHSTAG LEADERS HOLD SESSIONS

BERLIN, Jan. 19.—(By Associated Press.) Chancellor Wirth, Dr. Walter Rathenau, Hugo Stinnes, Dr. Karl Helfferich and other reichstag leaders, spent several days today discussing in a secret session of the foreign relations committee the Cannes reparations program. It is said that the discussions resolved themselves into a sharp debate between Dr. Rathenau on one hand and Herr Stinnes and Dr. Helfferich on the other.

JIM KELLY DISCARDED SMILE FOR BATHROBE

PEORIA, Ill., Jan. 19.—When Jimmy Kelly, Chicago bantamweight boxer, threw off his bathrobe and stepped out to shake hands with Stanley Everett, Peoria boxer, in the ring here last night he was discovered that he was wearing nothing but a smile. CALIFORNIA GOOD ROADS BRING IN 650,000 AUTOS

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 19.—California's highways were praised by Governor Stephens in an address here today at the annual convention of the California Road & Estate association. The governor said that constructive criticism was always welcome, but "blatant blasting" of the highways is unwarranted and harmful.

"The United States Bureau of Good Roads but a few months ago made a thorough investigation of our state highways," he said. "They made some criticism and offered some suggestions but—all in all—gave California's highways wonderful praise as well as credit for being honestly and economically built. If the federal government can praise so remarkably can't you do so? In justice to yourselves and to the state I urge upon you to do so.

"Our highways are better than those of any other state. They are not perfect, for nothing built by human hands can be, but they are the admiration of not only the traveling public, but they are the wonder of all fair thinking people, because they have stood so well the most phenomenal increase of traffic the world has ever seen. Ten years ago there were only 40,000 automobiles in California. This past year more than 650,000 licenses were issued by the State Motor Vehicle department. Ten years ago there were no auto busses carrying 20 to 50 people, nor were there auto trucks carrying 3 to 15 tons of merchandise or produce. Now there are more heavy trucks traversing our paved highways than there were light automobiles at that time."

UNREST INCREASES SOUTH IRELAND

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Unrest prevails in southern Ireland says the Dublin correspondent of the London Times, who intimates that followers of Eamon De Valera may be engaged in stimulating disturbances.

"A spirit of extreme republicanism," the correspondent declares "still flames in the south, where large bodies of armed men refuse to accept the treaty between Ireland Great Britain. There has been an epidemic of robbery and other crimes of violence in Dublin and in rural districts which demands strong measures from the government."

"The whole country heartily will support the provisional government in any measures taken to restore order but the next few weeks while English forces are being withdrawn may be a difficult time in the island."

The newspaper published in the interests of the followers of Mr. De Valera is said to have appealed for funds to organize popular opinion in favor of the republic.

BENEDICT ARNOLD'S KEY CHECK FOUND

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—What is believed to be the key check that served General Benedict Arnold's staff officers whenever they unlocked official documents is one of the revolutionary relics acquired by the field exploration committee of the New York historical society, it was learned today.

The key check probably assisted the traitorous Arnold the night he removed military plans from West Point and came down the Hudson to meet Major Andre of the British. It was found in the ruins of an old house in Brooklyn, and with it were about two dozen copper coins of the stamp of George II and George III.

The check is made of lead, about one-eighth of an inch thick and about three inches long. On one side is stamped "Arnold's staff," and on the other "Con. Army."

Basketball Record Made

MUNCIE, Ind., Jan. 19.—What is thought to be a record for individual scoring in a basketball game was made by Jones, forward on the Fort Recovery, Ohio, high school team who scored 88 points in a game against the St. Henry, Ohio, academy team at Fort Recovery last night. 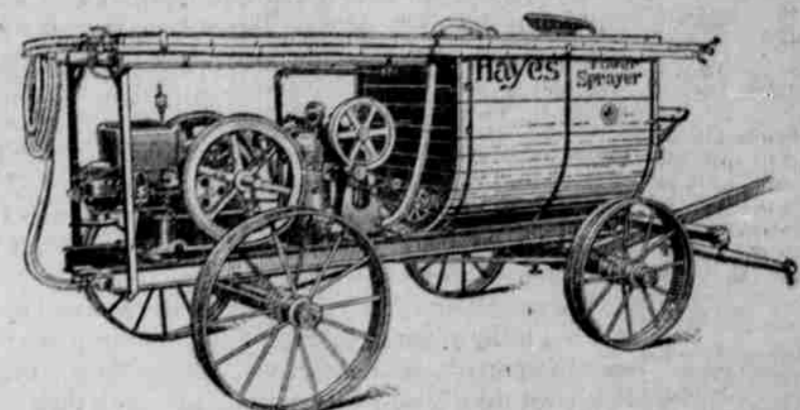

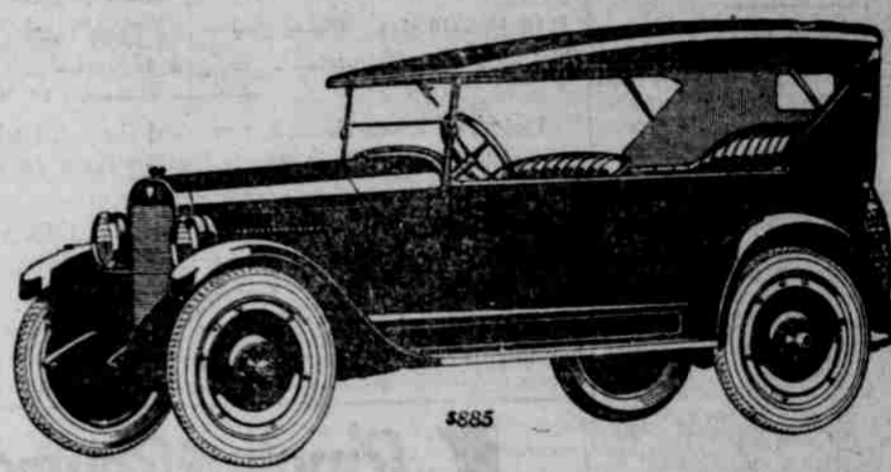
