CAMPAIGN TO BUY A TREE FOR FAIR, LAUNCHED

"Buy a tree" for the county fair grounds was a movement started at the meeting of the Scenic Preservation association, which was held at Phoenix last evening. The tree planting committee of the fair association is being asked to formulate a plan whereby citizens of Jackson county can assist in a systematic tree planting program to beautify the newly acquired grounds.

The committee will at once agree upon the varieties of trees that are to be planted, after which they will secure the quantity price. The next step will be a campaign to get fraternal orders, the different local societies and individuals of the county to purchase either one or more of them to be planted according to a well defined plan which in years to come will add much to the beauty and attractiveness of these community grounds.

A report was made regarding the destruction of the scenic beauties of the Pacific highway, on the Blakely mountains. A communication from the governor relative to same was read and John E. Yoon and R. A. Booth of the Oregon State Highway commission sent letters upon the subject. An ownership map of lands along this highway is now being prepared and an appeal by the governor will be made to the owners to preserve the trees immediately adjacent to the highway.

The appointment of a committee was authorized to draft a measure for the consideration of the legislature. The legislation sought is similar to that of an eastern state where trees within a certain radius from the roadway cannot be destroyed without the consent of the authorities. Trees along the highway, even though they may be on private property, when destroyed, are an injury to the state and such destruction should be prevented by law.

ASHLAND BANKER SEES GOOD YEAR

In its business digest of the year, the United States National Bank of Portland, publishes the following resume of the business and financial situation in southern Oregon, by J. W. McCoy, cashier of the First National Bank of Ashland: "We believe that this section has been peculiarly favored by not having the serious setbacks labor troubles and failures on account of reduced prices that have prevailed in many other sections. We had very large hay and grain crops and the apple crop was the largest in the history of the valley. The cherries, peaches and other small fruits produced most excellent prices and most of the pears were sold at good prices. We believe the retail establishments are doing about the same amount of business as last year and the general tone is rather optimistic for the coming year. The cattle men have suffered very severely by reason of the decline in prices, but with the aid of the local banks, most of them will be able to pull through and we hope will have something left over after settling with their creditors. Of course, in some cases the process of liquidation will probably take several years, but fortunately other demands on the banks are comparatively light and we can see no reason why pressure should be brought to bear on stock men for the liquidation of their paper in this district. We regret that the lumber industry is practically at a standstill here, but we are informed that the prospects for the coming year are better than for some years past, both with reference to operations and prices."
