They expect to take the water from the reservoir at the Prospect plant and bring it down in an eight-foot iron or steel pipe, having a tremendous fall from the reservoir to the Hole in the Ground and there with a drop of a thousand feet to the river one can hardly imagine the amount of force or power they can control. There is also another thought connected with the undertaking and that is the amount of labor that will be necessary to accomplish the job and how it will help the men who are now looking for employment.
