MEDFORD FIVE WILL PLAY EUGENE HI AT NAT TONIGHT

The Eugene basketball team and several subs headed by Coach F. L. Grannis, arrived in this city yesterday afternoon and played a game with the fast Talent team last night, defeating the Talent hoopers by a score of 22-15 before the lights in the Talent gymnasium failed and prevented the game from extending the full time. The Eugene quintet is expected to give the Medford basketeers a good battle this evening when the two teams meet on the Nat floor.

All of the Medford boys are in good shape and even though Eugene has the reputation of being fast, Medford has hopes of a victory this evening. Most of the men on the basketball squad at the local high school appear to be keeping training faithfully and with the nightly practice at the Nat, are expected to make a good showing against the northerners.

It is expected that tonight's contest will be one of the best of the season and in view of the fact that Medford is playing against one of the strongest Willamette valley teams it is hoped that the rooters will be out in full force and display a bit of the real old Medford-Hi spirit by getting together and rooting instead of scattering all over the hall and displaying an unenthusiastic air.

Eddie Durno, Oregon's famous basketball star, arrived in this city yesterday and will referee the contest.

5 LITTLE CHILDREN TRAMP WILDERNESS WITH DYING BABY

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Jan. 27.—Six little Indian children, who left the frozen bodies of their father and mother in the northern trapping wilderness, today reached Watcom on the Canadian government railway after a fortnight of tramping over snow covered ground. The five younger children, ranging upward from a baby of a few months, were brought back by their 14-year old brother and a neighbor.

Their father, Atchimo Nan Tachees, trapper, and their mother, both died of influenza in the family's woodland hut on Friday, January 13. That day the father called Atchimo, the oldest boy, to his bedside, told him the end was near, gave him \$1-200, the fruits of his trappings, and bade him care for his brothers and sisters. There was little food in the home.

Unable to bury the bodies, Atchimo left them in the shack with the five other children while he set out on snowshoes to fetch the nearest neighbor, thirty miles away. Two days later Atchimo came back with John Hingooosh, the neighbor. The five hungry tots were chewing raw moose flesh for nourishment. They had burned most of the furniture to keep from freezing. The bodies of their parents were frozen.

The younger children were packed on the dog sled by Hingooosh and Atchimo, who then began the long march to Watcom, where they were fed and given medical aid. It is feared the baby will die.

SOUTH METHODISTS WIN CHAMPIONSHIP Y. M. C. A. LEAGUE

The Y. M. C. A. basketball season came to an end last night. The South Methodist team won the championship with an unbroken string of victories for the season. With an opportunity to tie the winners last night, and so force a post-season game to decide the championship, the Disciples team worked with might and main and were in the lead at the end of the first half. However, the South M. E.'s came back strongly in the second lap and won handily with a score of 39 to 18. The latter team was somewhat thrown out of gear thru the absence of one of their regular forwards, but a new guard gave a good account of himself.

The girls' teams of the North Methodist and Christian churches staged a good preliminary game in which the Wesleyans won with the one-sided score of 26 to 7.

Considerable credit is due to the South Methodist team and supporters and especially Howard Graybeal, who plays at guard for the success of the league season. His enthusiasm and energy were largely responsible for the decision to take up basketball as a department of sport this year. The eternal question of a suitable place for practice and games was finally solved and the risk of the expense was taken. Three out of four of the teams have already paid their pro rata assessment and this with the gate receipts and the delinquent assessment will probably pay the expense of the season.

Attendance by church people has been good in some quarters, though not what the value of the season to the church interest would warrant. This is to be regretted, as the games have helped to solve the ever present query, "Where shall we find wholesome recreation for our young people?"

Baseball will probably be the next sport to be taken up by the league. This will give opportunity to retrieve lost laurels to some of the "also rans" in the hoop game.
