TO HATCH 1000 EGGS EVERY 3 WEEKS, PHOENIX

EDEN VALLEY, Jan. 26.—Mr. Lockwood of the White Wing Poultry farm near Phoenix, will set one thousand eggs about the 10th of February. These chicks go to parties in Ashland. After that there will be one thousand eggs set every three weeks until the 1st of May. Mr. Lockwood has five immense electric incubators and runs all of his equipment by electricity. He uses eggs from their own pens, of which there are about one thousand, mostly trap-nested hens.
