

SIX FATAL AUTO SMASHES, JACKSON COUNTY IN 1921

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—Fatalities from automobile accidents in Oregon in 1921 aggregated 92, according to reports from county coroners gathered by the Associated Press. Records of the state board of health show that the number of such fatal accidents in 1920 was 89, in 1919 the figure was 79, and in 1918, 66.

Multnomah county led with a total of 28, while fourteen counties had none. Accidents were most numerous in those counties traversed by the paved highways where traffic was heaviest.

The coroner of Crook county, reporting no accidents added "Crook county people drive carefully. Our roads don't stand speeding. Too rough."

The meeting was called by Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle at the request of Attorney General Daugherty, and will be attended by district attorneys who have been here at their annual state convention yesterday and today.

ROME, Jan.—The Italians are saving up their money notwithstanding the economic crisis in this country. Deposits in Italy's savings banks were increased by about \$59,000,000 lire in the first seven months of the present year. At par this would be equivalent to nearly \$192,000,000.

POLISH ORPHANS BEGIN LAST LAP TOUR OF WORLD

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—The steamship Princess Matoka, sailing today for Danzig had on her passenger lists 232 Polish orphans who were beginning the last lap of a trip around the world. They fled from their native land two years ago to escape starvation and death in the wake of the red bolshevik armies, then driving hither against the Polish forces defending the capital of that republic.

The little globe-trotters are to be returned to Warsaw, where the Polish government will find homes for them.

When the children awakened this morning aboard the vessel, Red Cross workers were on hand to present them with gifts and wish them bon voyage.

When the children reached Siberia, they were sent by the American relief society to this country by way of Japan. From Seattle they were sent to Chicago, where they were placed in orphan asylums.
About two years elapsed before the completion of arrangements, which will give them homes in Poland.

Fuses and Safety

A fuse in an electric circuit is a safety device designed to open the circuit at a certain load.

Its use is to prevent the wires in the circuit protected from carrying more than their rated capacity and to prevent fires and damage to electrical apparatus.

Fuses are placed at various points in the electrical circuits where the wires branch or change size; also at the entrance to the building to protect the wiring in the building, and on the pole outside of the building to protect the transformer and outside circuit.
