**MEDFORD FEELS EARTHQUAKE IN EARLY MORNING**

A distinct earthquake shock was felt in the Rogue River valley this morning between 5:20 and 5:30 o'clock, and was of about one minute duration. It did no damage, except to furnish a directory of citizens who get up before breakfast. It was felt in all sections of the Pacific coast.

Prof. F. C. Reimer of the Southern Oregon Experiment Station at Talent felt the trembling of the earth, while in his kitchen, and with scientific forethought looked at his watch. It was just 5:20 a. m. Prof. Reimer says he remarked to his womenfolk: "They're blowing up the bank again." Later he decided it was a seismic disturbance, due to nature shaking an angular shoulder off the coast of South America.

Thomas Merriman was also up when the misbehavior started, and was under the impression his car had broken out of the garage. He felt a trembling and was concerned lest Frisco be no more, as in 1906.

David Wood was also up, his little girl having the carache. The mirrors shook and the dishes rattled in the Woods home, and the little girl called the attention of her father to the capering of the furniture.

Miss Dolly Stowell of the Medford hotel dining room, was awakened by the tremor and thought the house was falling down, as the sills and rafters creaked.

H. O. Frohbach of the chamber of commerce was asleep when quiverings awoke him, and was astounded to see a rocking chair in motion.

Scores of people called up The Mail Tribune office to verify their impressions, and the tremor was also felt in the rural districts.

Mrs. Lottie Van Scoy was awakened from her sleep by the shock, and was frightened, as the building shook and rattled. Mrs. Van Scoy says that she heard that the shock was quite heavy at Prospect.

Fred Cummings' alarm clock went off this morning with a loud jangle and woke him up at about 5:18. Mr. Cummings declares that he had not set his clock and that the earthquake shock must have caused its unseasonable conduct.

In October, 1912 there was an earthquake felt in this section, one evening about 6:30 o'clock, and there was also a jolt from the disturbance that destroyed San Francisco in 1906.

**FAMED OSTEOPATH TO GIVE LECTURE LIBRARY FRIDAY**

Dr. Gerding, a well known neurologist, of national fame, is going to lecture in the auditorium of the public library at 2 p. m. Friday, Feb. 3rd. He will lecture on "Why Nervous Disorders Yield to Osteopathy."

Dr. Gerding is alienist and consulting neurologist at the Still-Hildreth Sanatorium, Macon, Mo. This is an osteopathic institution for the treatment of nervous and mental diseases. He is a graduate of the American School of Osteopathy, the Harvard College of Medicine and has studied in Europe. He is a teacher, lecturer, and diagnostician of mental disorders.

He will examine nervous and mental cases and lecture to the southern Oregon society Friday forenoon at 11:30. He will talk to the high school students, and will give the above free public lecture in the afternoon.

**WEDNESDAY FORUM PROMISES TO BE BEST OF THE YEAR**

No forum of the Medford chamber of commerce has been held during the past year that was of greater importance to the business men of Medford than the one to be held tomorrow, as W. D. B. Dodson who is to make the address has a keen insight of business conditions, due to the contact which he has with leading men of the country and particularly with the large business interests of Oregon.

Officially, W. D. B. Dodson is the manager of the Portland chamber of commerce. In his position he has the opportunity to know what is being contemplated in the development of the state. He is also a member of a commission to study the agricultural development of the state of Oregon and comes to Medford to secure first hand information as to the needs as well as to learn the advantages which this section of the state has to offer.

The business men of Medford can show the interest they have in development of this section by their attendance at the forum tomorrow noon at the Medford hotel.

**ASSAY MAP MADE OUT FOR LONE PINE SHOWS GOOD VALUE**

The general assay and assay map under preparation for the last month by Walter B. Robinson on the Lone Pine mine of the Great Western Mining company has recently been completed. Close to 100 assays have been made and show that all of the ore now blocked out presents an average value of six dollars per ton, according to the mine officials' statement.

Over 2900 feet of tunnel work has been completed on the property, it is claimed, and these tunnels make accessible the following bodies of ore. At the 190 foot level, 7500 tons showing an aggregate value of \$51,225; on the 200-foot level, 18,466 tons of ore showing a value of \$81,770, and on the 200-foot level 2,000 tons of ore showing a value of \$15,000. A total of \$147,995 worth of ore in sight as a result of tunnel work already completed.

A crew of men is at work at present doing development work on the mine and have been employed in this work for several months. A cross-cut tunnel has been driven 80 feet recently and has cut two veins, one 3 feet wide showing a value of \$29.20 and another recently cut which has not yet been sampled. The development work will be pushed and a still greater amount of low grade average ore blocked out. Experienced mining men declare that a property presenting large quantities of low grade ore worked on a large scale are the most successful. From this viewpoint the Lone Pine is one of the most promising projects in Southern Oregon at the present time.

The company operating the Lone Pine was recently reorganized and now has its offices in Portland.
