

REV. HUTCHINSON IS ORDAINED BY S. O. PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Southern Oregon met in special session Monday afternoon at 6:30 p. m., for the purpose of examining Rev. H. A. Hutchinson for the ministry of the Presbyterian church and if the way was clear to ordain him for the ministry.

Mr. Hutchinson was raised in Ireland where his father had been an elder in the Presbyterian church for 50 years. Attended a Methodist seminary and preached after coming to this country, for a short time in the Methodist church then asked to be admitted to Presbyterian church membership as that was the church of his youth. He was taken under the care of the presbytery and given a line of study looking to ordination. For several years he has been in charge of the Federated church at Oakland, where he has done excellent work. At the present time he is conducting evangelistic meetings at the Presbyterian church in Jacksonville, assisting the pastor, Rev. W. K. Howard.

The examination was passed most creditably. Mr. Hutchinson answering readily every question put by the theologians. At the close of the evening sermon, which he preached, the ordination vows and ceremony took place which made of Mr. Hutchinson a full fledged minister of the Presbyterian denomination.

Mr. Hutchinson is a young man of most excellent promise. Full of the spirit of tenderness, sympathy, pathos, humor, with a deep understanding of the gospel and a wide knowledge of human nature. Mr. Hutchinson plans soon to leave with his wife and children to visit the old home in Ireland where the aged father is still living, then he will return for several months study at Moody Bible school in Chicago and then back to Oregon for a new ministry.

The ladies of the church in Jacksonville treated the visiting minister to a sumptuous chicken dinner at the 6 o'clock hour which was fully appreciated.

PORTLAND EXPERT FOR CO-OPERATION AND HARD FACTS

W. D. B. Dodson, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, addressed the forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon. The main theme of his speech was co-operation of Oregon constructive organizations in the development of the state.

Mr. Dodson declared that Oregon had failed to advance at an equal pace with its neighboring states despite its superior natural resources and that the reason for this condition was a lack of co-operation. He stated that plans are now being formulated by the Portland chamber which will soon be laid before all constructive bodies in the state and that these bodies will be expected to co-operate in the execution of the plans which will be in the interest of statewide development.

Mr. Dodson spoke favorably of concentrated advertising of a conservative nature but did not favor the wild and demonstrative style of advertising that is liable to bring undependable and unstable population and purchasers. He expressed the opinion that advertising done by different sections of the state has been scattered to a large extent and that if it had been concentrated would have brought more effective results.

The condition, he declared, which exists in parts of the state where farmers and business men are unsuccessful and are willing to sell their lands and business at a fraction of the original cost must be cleared up and those sections made live, profitable districts. Success is the best possible advertisement.

He finished his address by saying that he had not conveyed the entire message that he had for the local chamber and by expressing the belief that the old pioneer spirit, which had been the motive in founding the state of Oregon and saving it for the United States, would again assert itself and bring the state up to its proper place on the Pacific coast.

Glenn Fabrick, Volney Dixon and George Treichler were initiated into the order of the "Two Toots" each of them having obtained two new members for the local chamber. Each was presented with the customary tin horn and each gave the specified two blasts required by membership committee members who are undergoing the initiation. George Treichler undoubtedly gained the honor of making the most noise but it is believed that he was given an unfair advantage. Will Warner, chairman of the membership committee presented the new "Two Toots" with the horns and Mr. Treichler received the largest and loudest one.

Newtown W. Burden occupied the post chairman during the meeting and extended the thanks of the assembly to Mr. Dodson for his interesting address.

JACKSON COUNTY BOND BUYERS SHY AT GRANTING PAR

Representatives of Portland and Spokane bond houses met with the county court today, and dickered without result over the purchase of county bonds. The court demands an amount as required by law, and the bond representatives desire a discount of 1.5 per cent. Aside from discussions on this point, the county court, in regular session added bills, and transacted routine business.

The grand jury for the February term of court will convene February 29, and the petit jury will be called February 27. A new grand jury will be drawn at this time of court, the old one completing its work.

So far there have been no Jackson county women to qualify for jury service, but any number, according to the county clerk have phoned to have their names removed from the list. Under the law, women do not have to serve unless they want to, but they will have to follow the red tape, to wit: due and official service by the sheriff, and a written declaration at that time, on a blank he will furnish.

CAMPAIGN TO BUY A TREE TO OPEN TOMORROW

The campaign to "Buy a Tree" for the County Fair Community grounds opens in all parts of Jackson county tomorrow. One dollar invested in a tree, which is to be planted within the next few weeks will in five years time be a tree worth all of five dollars and the slogan adopted is "One Dollar will do the trick."

There is to be a systematic plan of planting under the direct supervision of a committee of which W. H. Gorn is chairman and N. S. Bennett and Mrs. A. J. Hanby are associated with him.

Residents and fraternal organizations of the county are being asked to furnish the funds to plant these trees in the name of some members of their family or in the name of the fraternal organization. A careful record will be kept so that each individual may at any time see the growth which their tree is making.

Proper provisions have been made for the scientific planting of the trees and arrangements have been provided for their being watered during the entire summer.

The Senic Preservation association is conducting this campaign to "Buy a Tree" and anyone wishing to have a tree planted in the name of any one of their children, should make their check payable to the "Tree Planting Fund" and send same to the Exhibit Building at Medford, Oregon.

NOTED EVANGELIST TO SPEAK TONIGHT

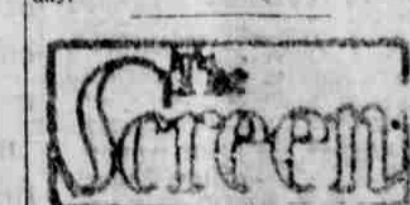
