James L. Wilson passed away at his home at Griffin Creek at 4 o'clock a. m. January 30 as a result of a paralytic stroke. He was born in Harding county, Iowa, June 24, 1856, and came to Oregon in April 1888, being married in 1889 to Josephine Griffin and has since resided in and near Medford. Deceased was survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Darby and the following sisters and brothers, Mrs. C. W. Frayley of Ashland, O. N. Wilson, Medford, Mrs. Belle R. Again Douglas Fairbanks has triumphed, in his latest film, "The Three Musketeers," which opened yesterday at the Page theatre for a four days engagement. As a story of real drama and astounding intrigue, with mirth provoking moments, "The Three Muske-

teers" achieves a place decidedly its own. Based on Alexander Dumas' world-famous novel which deals with the history of France in the early seventeenth century, the photoplay embodies all of the romantic adventure injected into that stirring tale.

All of the characters in this photoplay are admirably chosen. Nigel de Bruller as the cunning cardinal gives a marvelous characterization; Louis Menjou is the most majestic sort of a king; Mary MacLaren as Queen Anne o. Austria rules with queenly mien and at the same time endows the part with a wealth of humanness. As Constance, the little court seamstress who loves D'Artagnan and worships her queen, Marguerite De La Motte's delineation is superb. Milady, played by Barbara La Marr, is beautiful enough to upset any monarchy, and almost does with her duplicity and bewitching wiles.

Fairbanks does many hazardous stunts in this picture, he is by no means merely a fence-climbing, house-climbing jumping-jack. His duel with Bernajoux, the cardinal's greatest swordsman, is one of the most thrilling and intense pieces of action ever shown on the screen.

Carson superintendent of the Baptist Sunday school in Ashland, on "What I would do if I were a minister." He gave the ministers some very worth while advice in a very friendly spirit.

INDIAN REVOLUTION NOW DUE TO START

LONDON, Jan. 31.—(By the Associated Press)—Today having been fixed for the beginning of the "civil disobedience" in India, London discussed the situation with considerable anxiety. The plan laid down by M. K. Gandhi, non-co-operationist leader, to try the disobedience experiment first in the two areas of Bardoli and Amarda, seems from various reports little likely to be observed, indications being that the scheme will be put into operation throughout a much wider area. Official dispatches admit the seriousness of the situation, pointing out that "the mass of inflammable material is so great that the possibility of widespread disturbances in the near future cannot be ignored."

JAMES THORNTON, ASHLAND PIONEER, PASSES TO REWARD

ASHLAND, Feb. 1.—Funeral services of the late James Thornton, who died at the family home in this city, last Sunday morning, Jan. 29, were held on Tuesday afternoon, at the Methodist church, a large number congregating to pay the final tribute of respect to an esteemed pioneer citizen. Interment was in Ashland cemetery.

The deceased was an early pioneer of this section, his arrival here having antedated the coming of several other well known settlers. In years he far outlived the allotted span, his age having been nearly 95 years. Born in Indiana in 1827, he made the great trek to and from the coast twice in succession, in the early period of 1850 having come to this valley on the initial trip at a period when the journey was not only arduous but perilous as well. Mr. Thornton was a man of diversified industries, having been successively identified with manufacturing, mining and ranching pursuits, his later activities having been connected with horticulture in which science, as practically applied, he was an adept. He was a man of genial mould and kindly temperament, most interesting in recounting the events of early epochs, having had a wide experience connected with current events of his day and generation, not only throughout Jackson county but also in various other localities, notably the mining districts over in Siskiyou territory.

Mr. Thornton was twice married, and leaves seven children, among whom Mrs. Robert Garrett, Mrs. Laura Willey, Sheridan and Ed Thornton reside in Ashland, O. A. Thornton is a resident of Gresham, and Mrs. Hattie Hayes of Portland, while Henry Thornton is living in the vicinity of Perist in this county. For years the deceased was an invalid, and the long weary vigil is ended, incident to which relatives and friends bestowed every affection and care in behalf of one who as husband, father and ideal citizen met life's responsibilities with courage and fortitude.
