

## GATES' DECISION ON GOVERNORSHIP EXPECTED TODAY

Nothing is known about Mayor C. E. Gates' plans for the next few days, but he is expected home Sunday or Monday from Portland where he has been looking after his gubernatorial aspirations this week.

"Pop" was supposed to have arrived in Portland today from his side trip from that city to Spokane, and is thought to be walking around in the state metropolis with bent form, beetling brows and hands carefully cupping both ears eager to hear the first intimation of what republican candidate for governor has been endorsed by the Federated Societies—whatever that is.

On this endorsement, which has been eagerly sought after by most of the various candidates for governor seems to hang victory at the May primaries. Should the endorsement come to the Medford man he will become an active candidate and get into the contest with both feet and otherwise spread his manly form into all parts of Oregon in an effort to convince the voters of the state that the next governor should be of the Rogue River valley brand.

Mayor Gates proclaimed recently that if he did not get the endorsement he would not enter the race for governor. This endorsement was supposed to be made public in Portland today, but the newspapers of Portland yesterday intimated that it might be another week before it would be forthcoming.

## WIFE OF FORMER MEDFORDITE DIES

With much regret and surprise the Methodists and many other citizens of Medford received the news of the death of Mrs. Irene Gilbert, 54 years old, wife of Rev. E. E. Gilbert, superintendent of the Salem district of the Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church and a former pastor of the First M. E. church of Medford. She died at her home in Salem last Thursday night after a week's illness.

Mrs. Gilbert was born in Cedar Falls, Iowa, and was educated at Cedar Falls, the Iowa state normal school and the Northwestern university at Evanston, Ill. The Gilberts came to Salem in January, 1920, from Medford, when Rev. Mr. Gilbert succeeded to the superintendency of the Salem district. Mrs. Gilbert was active in missionary and Sunday school work of the Methodist church and a prominent member of the Eastern Star. Besides her husband she is survived by two children, Miss Iola Ruth Gilbert, a student at the medical school of the University of Oregon, Portland, and Wendell William Gilbert.

## PRINCE OF WALES HONORED WHEN HE KILLS 1ST TIGER

CALCUTTA.—The Prince of Wales received an orthodox Hindu welcome when he entered the territory of Nepal where he shot his first tiger. At the Nepal borderline, the prince passed through a triumphal arch decorated with banana leaves and skins of tigers, bears, black deer and other animals.

On the other side of the arch was written in gold "Heartily Welcome to Britain's Sporting Prince," and on the reverse side bore "God Bless the Kaiser-Hind's Soldier Son."

As he entered the territory of Nepal, men stood on both sides of the road with brass and copper plates in their hands, containing flowers, rice, incense and abir (vermillion powder). These they threw at the prince, who acknowledged their warm welcome by leaving his car and saluting the men, who were overjoyed at this show of politeness.

The tiger shot by the Prince measured nine feet, six inches in length. Three other tigers were shot by members of the prince's staff.

OPEN DOOR TREATY ACCEPTED

The new treaty for revising the Chinese tariff also was presented and the way was cleared for another and final plenary session Monday, when President Harding will mark the end of the history-making conference with an address.

Without a word of discussion the treaty was approved on a roll call of the nine powers.

A declaration by China not to alter any portion of her territory also was put on the conference record.

Then the Chinese tariff agreement was presented by Senator Underwood, chairman of the committee that drafted it.

A resolution was adopted unanimously which was designed to provide procedure for dealing with questions that might arise in connection with the execution of provisions of articles of the Chinese general treaty

relating to the open door policy and conduct of the Chinese railroad.

It provides that a board of reference be established in China to which any questions arising might be referred for investigation and report. It also stipulates that the special conference provided for in the treaty relating to Chinese customs tariff shall formulate for approval of the powers concerned a detailed plan for the execution of the board.

At 12:35 p. m., the calendar was finished, and Arthur J. Balfour, head of the British delegation, took the floor and opened what was expected to be the final wave of oratory marking the conclusion of the work of the conference.

they say, that a love affair at one time or another existed between each of these and the slain director.

Police say, without mentioning the name, that a motion picture actress is the center of their investigation. The theory of a "revenge" motive with jealousy as the probable direct cause is being analyzed, they say.

Edna Purviance and Mrs. Douglas MacLean, the former actress and the latter the wife of an actor are incidental witnesses in the case.

The chequered and adventurous affairs of the slain director, engineer, Klondike pioneer and student of psychology, known for years by his most intimate friends here as a bachelor living alone in a luxuriously appointed dwelling place and often visited by actresses, today reveals that he has been living under a changed name, has a daughter 13 years of age, was divorced and possibly had been married and divorced a second time.

Taylor Had a Past.  
He was formerly known as William Deane Tanner, according to the deceased wife of his brother, Mrs. Ada Deane Tanner at Monrovia, near here, who announced last night that the slain man had supported her by sending checks for \$50 monthly for the last six years.

Police are continuing their search for Edward F. Sands, reported also to be known as Edward Fitz Strathmore, the missing brother of Taylor, who disappeared several months ago, following which Taylor filed with the police charges of grand larceny against him. While most intimate friends in the film world of Taylor did not know of his previous marriage to Taylor, articles stolen from Taylor. A life in fear of death, at least during the last few days of his existence, adds to the dramatic mystery of the dual existence of Taylor. He mentioned to at least one person, police say, that he had a premonition of death.

Threatened to Kill Vail.  
Claire Windsor, motion picture actress, revealed a threat by Taylor against Sands. She told of accompanying Taylor to a hotel party within a week before his death. She said Taylor was talking of the robbery of certain jewels, which the police and Taylor attributed to Sands, according to the police. Miss Windsor said that Taylor in this connection declared:

"If I ever lay my hands on Sands I will kill him."

Miss Windsor said that Taylor seemed very determined, "because Sands robbed him of every cent he had at the time."

"Mr. Taylor made no secret of his plan to kill his valet," she said.

Miss Windsor said that she had known Taylor for a long time, but never very well.

"That a woman was involved in the murder was the theory advanced by Sheriff William L. Traeger of Los Angeles county."

"From what I have been able to learn," the sheriff said, "it appears to me that one woman and one man are responsible for the victim's death. The woman supplied the incentive and the man did the slaying."

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Chapters in the life of William Desmond Taylor, motion picture director, who was slain in Los Angeles Wednesday night were revealed here today by his friends. It was said that Taylor was well known previous to 1903 as William Deane Tanner, an art connoisseur. He was then the manager of a prominent firm of art and antique furniture dealers, and had a wide circle of friends. In 1901 his friends said he secretly married Miss Ethel May Harrison, a member of the original Florida company and they had a child, Ethel, now 14 years old. In 1908, ac-

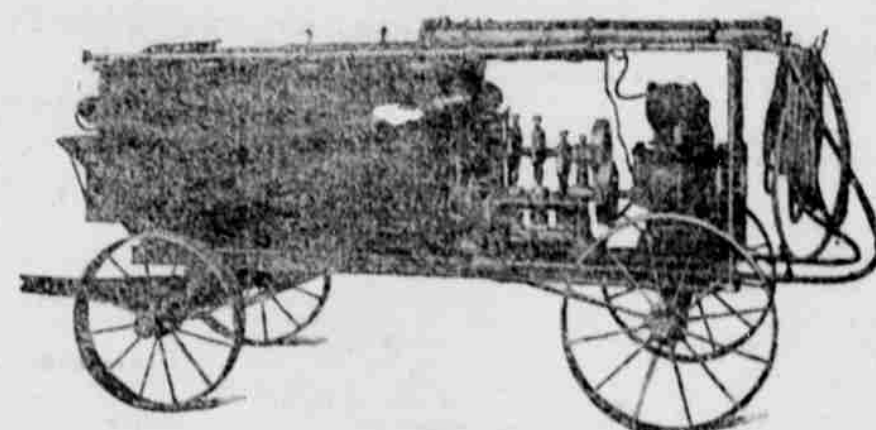

## Fuses and Safety

A fuse in an electric circuit is a safety device designed to open the circuit at a certain load.

Its use is to prevent the wires in the circuit protected from carrying more than their rated capacity and to prevent fires and damage to electrical apparatus.

Fuses are placed at various points in the electrical circuits where the wires branch or change size; also at the entrance to the building to protect the wiring in the building, and on the pole outside of the building to protect the transformer and outside circuit.

When a fuse blows, there is usually a cause for it, such as an overload or damaged circuit and the cause should be found and repaired before replacing the fuse.
