

NEWSPAPERS GET FIRST PLACE IN LOCAL AD VALUE

Because of the many requests being made upon the merchants to purchase advertising space, a committee of the Retail Merchants Bureau, after a thorough investigation as to what advertising mediums were worthy and unworthy of support, made their report last evening to the Bureau and the same was unanimously adopted.

Newspapers, bulletin boards and motion picture theatre slides were the three mediums classified as worthy. These classified as unworthy of patronage are hotel registers, theatre programs, menu cards, indoor bulletins, wall cards or booklets for hotels and outdoor motion advertising.

Programs of entertainment or any other form of publication for churches or fraternal organizations which is to be paid for by the sale of advertising space was not considered a good advertising medium and such space should only be purchased by merchants who are members of church or fraternal organization getting out these publications.

The purchase of expensive calendars is discouraged and business men who find it necessary to buy them are asked to purchase them locally in order that this money may be kept at home.

Small signs along the highways destroy the scenic beauty and as it is against the law to post them, they should be removed.

Advertising in the High Times for the issues of this school year is approved, however, at the beginning of the school year in September the merchants should not patronize same until a more satisfactory circulation is secured by the student body.

Merchants are asked not to purchase advertising space in the High School annual until the committee on advertising has had the opportunity to confer with the committee of the student body having same in charge.

Merchants are asked not to purchase tickets of any kind except for entertainments of the churches, lodges and societies to which they belong.

Before giving donations to solicitors of charitable institutions, ask for credentials from the chamber of commerce who will issue same after an investigation of the worthiness of the institution.

Merchants are asked to refuse to purchase advertising space in any of the mediums classified as unworthy and also in any other forms of advertising not listed.

Order Sands' Arrest

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—A telegraphic warrant charging Edward F. Sands, alias Edward Fitz Strathmore, former butler to William Desmond Taylor, with the murder of the film director in his apartment here was issued by the Los Angeles police department late last night and wired to Constable A. B. Berninz, at Carlin, Nev., according to information received by the Los Angeles Examiner this morning.

MACHINE ARRIVES FOR CONSTRUCTION DIAMOND L. ROAD

A large, combination scarping and grading machine arrived this morning at Haymarket Square by members of the federal forest service. The machine will be taken to the Diamond Lake country where it will be used in the completion of the road between Diamond and Crater lakes. Hugh B. Raykin of the forest service, states that work on this road will begin about the middle of May and that the road will be completed, graded and sixteen feet wide by the time Crater Lake National park opens this coming season.

A road to Natural Bridge and a road into the Union creek campground are also to be completed this spring. The new road to the Natural Bridge will lead directly to the water's edge at the point where the bridge crosses the river. This will make the walk of more than a quarter of a mile over bumpy lava unnecessary. Formerly this walk, from the end of the old road to the Natural Bridge was fraught with the perils of barked shins, skinned knees and bumped elbows but it will be possible next summer for tourists to roll up on air to a point where they can view the beauties of the Rogue river and the natural wonder of that phenomena, Natural Bridge.

Mary Minter Loves Him

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—A scented note dropped from one of Taylor's books while police detectives were making an examination of his effects, according to the Los Angeles Examiner. It was on the butterfly monogrammed stationery of Mary Miles Minter. It read as follows:

"Dearest: I love you—I love you—I love you."
"X.X.X.X.X."
"Yours always,"
"Mary."

The last "X" was two inches in height, followed by an exclamation point an inch in height.

Mary Miles Minter did not deny authorship of the letter, according to the Examiner.

"I did love William Taylor," she said. "I loved him deeply and tenderly, with all the admiration and respect a young girl gives to a man with the culture of Mr. Taylor."

Taylor and Miss Minter met at Santa Barbara two years ago. He was her director. They later went to New York with the company.

The wealthy young New York man who was reported to have left Los Angeles on the day following the murder of Taylor, and who was enamored of one of the motion picture actresses whom police have been questioning in connection with the case was located last night by private detectives. According to the investigators he gave an account of himself which they say practically eliminates him from consideration of the case.

Retrenchment on a great scale would be hard on individuals he said, "but in a time of great industrial depression such as that through which the world at present is passing, the necessity of the situation that economy be practiced by all, and in every direction and I look for your support in securing essential economies."

In both the house of lords and commons he said:

"The articles of agreement signed by my ministers and the Irish delegation to which you have already signified assent, have now been approved in Ireland and the provisional government contemplated in that instrument is at present engaged in taking over the administration of the country."

Irish Free State

"Final establishment of the Irish free state as a partner in the British commonwealth is anxiously awaited throughout the world. You will therefore be invited at an early day to consider such measures as may be necessary to give effect to the agreement. A bill of indemnity will also be submitted to you."

"The great continued volume of unemployment among my people causes me deep concern and will continue to receive the earnest attention of my ministers. The only remedy for this distressing situation is to be found in appearance of international rivalries and suspicions and in the improvement of conditions under which trade is carried on all over the world."

"For these reasons I welcome arrangements now making for the meeting of an international conference at Geneva at which I trust it will be possible to establish peace on a fair basis in Europe and to reach a settlement of many important questions arising out of the pressing need for financial and economic reconstruction."
"Proposals will be submitted to you

for the reform of the house of lords and adjustment of the differences between the two houses."

Among the bills for submission to parliament, most of which are purely domestic, is one relating to the establishment of an international trade corporation.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—(By Associated Press.) The critical stage which the Irish negotiations have reached prevented Prime Minister Lloyd George and Asquith Chamberlain, government leader in the house of commons from attending the opening of parliament today.
