STORM KING HOLDS RANIER CLIMBERS IN BLIZZARD GRIP

PARADISE INN, Mount Rainier, Feb. 8.—The storm king displayed his ugly temper on the upper slopes of Mount Rainier Tuesday, the result being that another day was virtually lost to Jacques Bergues, Jean and Jacques Landry, Alpine mountaineers who are here plotting to conquer the icy slopes of the mountain that has never yet let man set his foot on its summit in winter.

A heavy wind is blowing and beating in from the west, fresh snow. The three mountaineers remained indoors and virtually abandoned their plans of moving to Anvil Rock today. The army signal corps men seeking to complete the laying of their telephone-telegraph line to Anvil Rock, had encountered a slide about a mile above Paradise Inn where they were turned back by snow and heavy wind.

Superintendent Peters of the Rainier park today announced that to prevent any controversy arising as to whether the men actually reach the summit, a committee of three will be appointed to review all the evidence and announce their findings. The mountaineers also will leave a bottle containing their names in a moment of rock where it may be found by those who make the climb during the summer months.

S. ZBYSZKO WINS BY ROLLING FALL, CROWD PROTESTS

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—Rolling and flying falls in wrestling, revived by the New York state athletic commission, have been again scored. Stanislaus Zbyszko, the 47-year-old Pole, retained his world's heavyweight championship last night in a bout with Earl Caddock, the former champion, by virtue of this rule of ancient days. Zbyszko was awarded two rolling falls and each one caused a five-minute demonstration of disapproval on the part of the 12,000 spectators. Caddock had regained his feet after wriggling out of a half-Nelson and arm lock when the referee announced that Zbyszko had won the first fall. Caddock then pinned the Pole's shoulders to the mat after ten minutes, 30 seconds of wrestling.

WASHINGTON FIVE HOLDS BIG LEAD COAST BASKETBALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7.—University of Washington continues to advance unchecked in this year's race for the Pacific coast conference basketball championship. 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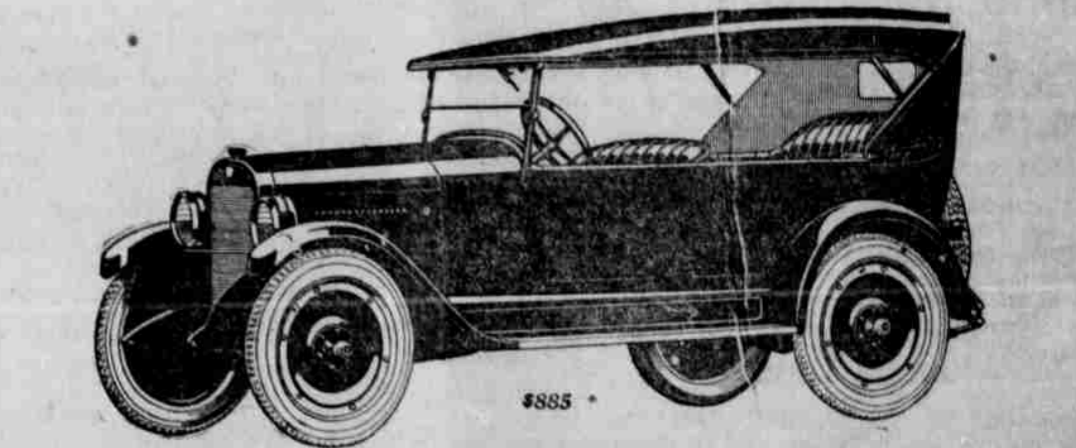
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
