CRATER LAKE TO GET \$7000 MORE THAN LAST YEAR

In view of the fact that the government is cutting down to the bone, all federal department expenses, Alex Sparrow is well pleased with the appropriation allotment for this year for Crater National park, which, as announced in Interior department appropriation bill introduced in Congress yesterday provides \$22,000 for the park, \$24,000 of which is for maintenance and \$8000 for improvements.

Although this sum is far less than the original estimate for the park's needs prepared by the national park department, and is \$2000 less than the final amount asked for before the bill was introduced yesterday, it is \$7000 more than was allowed the park last year.

Originally Mr. Sparrow and the national park officials made their estimate of the amount to be asked for as \$30,000, which provided for the proposed paving this year of the first 2 1/2 miles beyond the park entrance by the Medford-Crater Lake road, the road stretch between this city and the lake, because of its deep dust and ruts, an improvement which has long been desired by Crater Lake park officials and travelers. But on account of Uncle Sam being so hard up this year and with his huge expenses continuing to pile up, the national park officials found it necessary to cut out this projected improvement for this year, and finally decided to ask for \$25000 altogether. In Superintendent Sparrow's opinion the Interior department appropriation bill will pass without any further change in the Crater Lake appropriation.

BULGARIA WANTS U. S. LOCOMOTIVES

SOFIA.—Christo Manoloff, Bulgarian minister of railways is anxious to have American locomotive manufacturers and railroad supply houses look into the possibilities of business in Bulgaria.

He says that one of the greatest present needs in Bulgaria is a plant for the construction and repair of locomotives and freight cars. He has on hand nearly 100 locomotives and several thousand freight cars awaiting repairs and the country has no facilities for this purpose.

"Although our country is going through a period of great financial and economic stress," said M. Manoloff, "we are preparing actively for the extension and reconstruction of our railways. We would like to have the help of your resourceful and experienced American railway men and contractors in this direction."

"We are planning the construction of more than 500 miles of new railroads in which we need foreign technical skill and capital. Americans will have the preference because I think they lead the world in these two requirements."
