PRICE FIXING BY U. S. GOVERNMENT IS NOT ADVISABLE WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Price fixing by the government except in emergencies, is inadvisable, Victor Murdock, a member of the federal trade commission declared today at a hearing before the house agricultural committee which is considering a bill by Representative Sinclair, republican, North Dakota, to provide for annual fixing by a commission of government officials of maximum prices for certain family products. "No one can occupy the place I have with the federal trade commission without looking with suspicion on governmental price fixing," asserted Mr. Murdock, adding that such a policy might be the only means of affording relief temporarily during emergencies. Declaring that farmers are unable to organize as effectively as other classes of producers, Mr. Murdock contended that they needed the special consideration of the government.
