World war veterans' organizations of the Pacific northwest are urged to insist that disabled veterans of this district taking vocational training at the expense of the government "play ball" in an honest effort toward rehabilitating themselves, instead of "taking training for the sole purpose of remaining on the payroll, which ranges from \$100 to \$150 a month," according to an appeal made by Director Charles R. Forbes of the United States veterans' bureau through the Seattle district office. Congress has provided liberally for the training of veterans who have vocational handicaps due to wounds, injuries or disease contracted in line of duty, declared Director Forbes. "The entire rehabilitation program will be a dismal failure unless the veteran himself 'plays ball'."
