NOTED AUTHORITY ON LINCOLN AT ANNUAL BANQUET

Prof. Clark E. Bissett of Seattle of the law department of the University of Washington, who is the main speaker at the Lincoln club banquet here tonight, and who arrived in the city yesterday afternoon, put in a busy day today meeting old friends and acquaintances around town, and delivering addresses at the University club luncheon this noon, and at the high school and the St. Mary's academy this afternoon.

Of genial personality and a good mixer, the scholarly and widely traveled visitor of oratorical fame, who is the guest of the city today, not only has created a splendid impression and added many new warm friends, but has aroused an eagerness to hear his address on Lincoln tonight.

Prof. Clark is one of the ablest informed men on Lincoln in the United States, and possesses the third largest collection of books, manuscripts and pamphlets on Lincoln in this country, comprising 2270 separately titled pieces of literature on the ever interesting subject, which he has been 40 years in gathering, and many of which are in various foreign languages. The professor has traveled over the world several times.

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At 6:25 p. m. Avard Whitman led a union devotional meeting and 7:30 p. m. Dr. Young preached an interesting sermon. The next rally will be held at Grants Pass in April. The local B. Y. P. U. reported 18 new members in the past two months and is in a flourishing condition.
